POTATOES AU GRATIN

Melt two tablespoons butter; in it cook two tablespoons flour, and one-fourth teaspoon, each of salt and pepper; add one cup of milk and stir until boiling. Butter a baking dish suitable for the table; grate half a cup of cheese; make ready two cups of potatoes in thin slices or half-inch cubes. In the baking dish arrange layers of potatoes, cheese and sauce; repeat these layers having sauce above. Mix half a cup of cracker crumbs with three tablespoons of melted butter and spread over the sauce. Let bake until the potatoes are very hot throughout and the crumbs browned. The cheese may be omitted.

LONDON, June 16.—Right Hon. J. H. Thomas, former Lord Privy Seal, who visited Canada in the course of his attempts to relieve the British unemployment situation, today took over his new duties as Secretary of State for the Dominions. Mr. Pete, McMahon of Kensington, was in our town on the 16th.

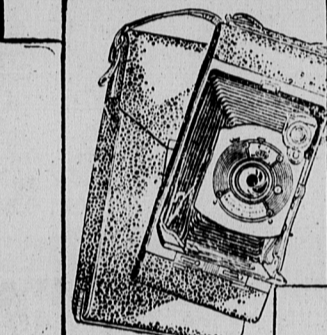
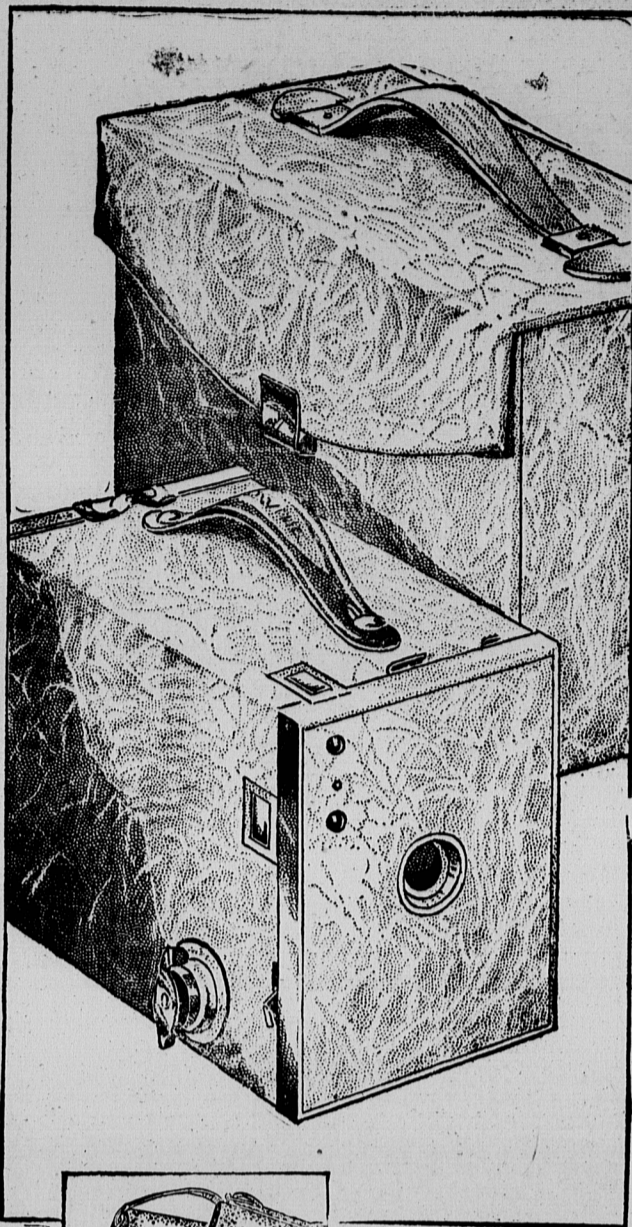
HAMPTON AND VICINITY

Her many friends will be glad to hear that Miss Dorothy Dixon, Desable, who is in the Prince Edward Island Hospital for treatment, is doing nicely.

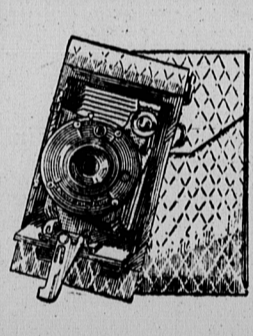
