Statement of railway officials that the ship could not be salvaged. Another matter dealt with was that of the proposed transfer of the Trans-Canada Air Lines feeder service to a private company. In connection, Mr. E. M. Bagnall, Chairman of a special Air Services Committee presented a report on a record of Trans-Canada-Canadian Airways during the same period of the previous year cancelled by 28 trips.

Stript Regulations

It is felt that the poorer record of T. C. A. is caused in part by the more strict flying regulations, under which they operate and without relaxing them the extra risk, he then it is the opinion of this committee, that, as these regulations are set up for longer trips lasting several hours, the question of relaxing them somewhat for the much shorter runs between Moncton, Charlottetown and Summerside might well be discussed with the Board of Transport, Mr. Bagnall advised that the Board should be contacted in connection with the service to that "is even worse."

In connection with instructions to the committee to approach Premier Campbell with the view to securing improvements to the Trans-Canada service shortly before it was inaugurated, Mr. Bagnall said that the Premier had advised against taking further action until it could be determined how the service would "work out." As sufficient time has been allowed to form an opinion, we deem it proper that these matters be again taken up particularly the question of Sunday service and the application of standard Trans-Canada conditions to the service, Mr. Bagnall said in conclusion.

At a meeting of the Board of Transport, Mr. Bagnall, Vice President of the Board, presided, in the presence of President, Lt. Col. K. S.
