DEATH OF REV. ISAAC J. LIDSTONE A NATIVE OF CAPE WOLF, P. E. I.

Particulars of the death of Rev. Isaac H. Lidstone, who passed away some time ago at Winthrop, Me., was received this week from Mr. Edward S. Lidstone, a cousin of the deceased now residing in California.

Mr. Winslow J. Lidstone of Summerside, a nephew of the late Rev. Isaac H. Lidstone was the recipient of the particulars which will be of interest to Island relatives and friends.

Rev. Isaac H. Lidstone was born in Cape Wolf, Prince County on September 3rd, 1865, and was the son of the late Richard Lidstone of that place.

He left his native land early in life and took up the ministry. He joined the East Maine Conference in 1892 and was always true to the trust committed to him. He held pastorates in the following places: Ashland, Mapleton, Washburn, Hartland, St. Albans, East Corinth and Corinth, Guilford, Vinalhaven, Union, Darnford, Danforth and Westport, Caribou and Woodlands, Pata Machias, Calais, Knight Memorial and Winthrop, retiring in 1936.

Lidstone was an eloquent preacher and faithful pastor, and his singing was an inspiration. He was a friend one could love and trust, and will be kindly remembered by his former parishioners.

Mr. Lidstone was twice married. His first wife Agnes M. Whittier of Corinth died in 1909.
