## Rangers Preparing For First Test Against Mainland Team On December 16

### Anderson And Gottselig Lead Scoring Race

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—(CP)—Chicago's Johnny Gottselig, at the head of the National Hockey League scoring race almost since the start of the season, has to share first place with Johnny Anderson of New York Americans, according to tonight's weekly statistical figures issued by the league.

The black Hawk stickhandling master is credited in the official figures with seven goals and six assists, while Anderson's 13 points are made up of six goals and seven assists. The pair are tied up on their nearest rivals, Toe Blake of Montreal Canadiens and Bill Cowley of Boston Bruins.

While the official statistics show Gottselig obtaining a goal and an assist during the last week, the Hawks actually scored only one goal in their two games of the week. Joffre Deslats was the scorer, and he also is credited with a goal in the league's compilation.

Anderson is shown as having picked up three assists over the previous weeks total, though Americans scored only one goal in the previous week's statistics. Anderson had been given one less assist than appeared in the unofficial compilation. A teammate, Eddie Wiseman, also receives an assist not appearing in unofficial summaries, and in the previous week he also had been given one less than the unofficial figures show.

Leadership in goals, according to the league's figures, is divided between Gottselig and Blake at seven apiece, with Blake having four assists. Anderson is one to the rear. Cowley, Boston's great play-making centre, heads the circuit in assists. Of his 11 points, nine were amassed in helping out on fellow players' goals.

Alex Levinsky of Chicago now under suspension for what manager Bill Stewart claims to be indifferent playing, is shown at the top of the penalty list. The Hawk defenceman has served 22 minutes, against 21 for bumping Bingo Kampman of Toronto Maple Leafs. Red Horner, another Leaf, is a close third with 20 minutes.

### Schmeling Wins Halifax Bout

HALIFAX, Dec. 5.—(CP)—Fritz Schmeling of Port Elgin, N. S., scored a three-round knockout over Solder Harnes of Kentville, N. S., in the main bout of the Checkers Boxing Club program.

Harnes started out strong, but Schmeling came back gungging and pounded the Annapolis alley crapper up and down off the canvas from the second round until late in the third. Altogether, Harnes took five long counts, Schmeling, 169.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Personal nominations of a former country boy saying farewell to sports after 10 happy years of reporting the highlights of the passing parade—Greatest United States of America football team—Minnesota's 1934 masterpiece. It was so good that the day before the Gophers played their finale against Wisconsin, a Minnesota coach said: "We have no worse Wisconsin can't win." Minnesota won handily.

Most thrilling football game—Short Centre, California, Notre Dame in 1931 when Johnny Baker's goal kick beat the Irish, 16-14 to shatter the Notre Dame's long winning streak.

Best sport—Baseball. It is the most hypercritical of all sports with leaders who are incorruptible. Baseball has more romance than any other sport. To some results are unpredictable and all youth, educated and illiterate ones to success.

Greatest press agent—in 10 years a sports writer meets 10,000 publicity men. Greatest of them all is Frank Winchel of Tampa, Florida. A fighter who had more than a good pair of legs and arms. He had brains—and used them.

Keenest wit—Nobody ever got the better of Knute Rockne. His assignment—Covering the funeral of Rockne, a restless man who was walking on the highest clouds of football achievement when he died in an airplane crash.

Funniest hero—Lefly Gomez, only pitcher to win six world series games. The good Senator is worth a laugh a minute with his cracks. One of his best when Howard Hughes flew around the world in three days and 19 hours, the Senator said: "That's my idea of an aviation. I could fly around the world with him without even missing my regular turn on the road."

All-around hero—Bert will never produce a greater hero or nicer man than Bobby Jones. Great opposites in sports writing. Grantland Rice, who won fame saying only good things about sports heroes; Westbrook Pegler, the game's greatest satirist.

Rich sportsman with the common touch—Tom Yawkey, multi-millionaire owner of Boston Red Sox. Everyone is pulling for Tom to realize his dream of a world championship ball club. A great guy.

Slickest man in sport—Old Bob Quinn, baseball's "rag man" from Boston who trades everything from old corks and pennies for stars. Luckiest man—Dizzy Dean who is more out of baseball than he ever went in to it.

Saddest figure—Babe Ruth. He's been offered 1,000 jobs since he quit playing baseball but he wants out of baseball assignment. Greatest follows—Newspaper copy readers who gave an ex-country boy a break.

## Armstrong Scores Kayoe Victory Over Manfredi In Third Round Of Title Bout

CLEVELAND, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Henry Armstrong knocked out Al Manfredi of San Francisco in the third round tonight in his second defence of his world welterweight championship before 12,724 fans.

Referee Tony Labranch stopped the bout at 1:45 of the third round. Manfredi was helpless through the second and third rounds and was wobbling badly and completely defenceless when Labranch stopped between them. The terrific pace set by Armstrong wore Manfredi out early in the second round and the San Franciscan did not throw a punch in the third.

Not Knocked Down  
Manfredi was not knocked down. Boxing nicely from long range, he held Armstrong even in the first round as the boxer blaster from Los Angeles spent all his time trying to get in close. The round was fast but no seriously damaging blows were landed.

Armstrong forced the fighting through the second round and a right to Manfredi's head soon had Al wobbling. Armstrong, pumping piston-like blows to head and body, made no effort to measure his opponent for a knockout shot.

Fought Cautiously  
The negro might easily have ended it in the second round but he made sure of his victory and wearing Manfredi down. Armstrong weighed 134 3-4 pounds and Manfredi, 146.

Earlier, Solly Krieger, National Boxing Association champion from Brooklyn, N. Y., punched out a bloody victory over Carmen Barth of Cleveland in an over-weight bout.

The durable Krieger gained a long lead in the middle rounds when every blow he swung seemed to take effect. Krieger weighed 163 1-2 and Barth 163 1-4.

Ambers Wins  
Lou Ambers, ex-lightweight champion from Herkimer, N. Y., won a technical knockout over veteran Frankie Wallace of Cleveland when Wallace failed to answer the bell for the seventh round. Wallace was forced to quit because of an injured right hand.

It had been an even fight up to the finish. Ambers weighed 136 3-4 and Wallace 139 1-2. Peter Carron, former featherweight champion from Birmingham, Ala., gave Cleveland Golden Gloves guard Mike Gamiere a fancy boxing lesson in the first of the 10-rounds. Carron took six of a foul, while one was even. Sarson weighed 124, Gamiere 135 1-2.

TORONTO, Dec. 5.—(CP)—A special meeting of the Canadian Rugby Union Executive was called for Thursday night to deal with Martin Gainer's eligibility for the Canadian football final Saturday between Winnipeg Blue Bombers, the western challengers, and Toronto Argonauts.

The storm was whipped by the R. U. ruling Gainer failed to qualify under the residence requirements apparently was being allowed to discontinue until the meeting.

Joe Ryan, manager of Bombers, commented tersely that "I fail to see why they have to wait until Thursday for a meeting."

Meanwhile Gainer took his place at middle as Bombers, who arrived here this morning from Winnipeg and left soon afterwards for Oakville, Ont., went through their first practice on the grounds of Aonley College, where Bombers will live and train for the week.

### Grimes Signs To Handle Mt'l. Royals

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 5.—Enough baseball conversation to fill an encyclopedia echoed through hotel lobbies today but out of a hub-bub of first round forecasts little outstanding news developed.

Meanwhile one of the greatest advance influxes of baseball leaders invaded the city for the fifth annual sessions of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, several circuits drifted off into private rooms for their annual meetings.

Many big major league deals have been listed in rumor ranks since the 1938 season closed, but only a sprinkling of changes reached news stages after day-long huddles.

The first deal of the "hot stove" league sessions found the Cincinnati Reds selling pitcher Joe Cascarella to Buffalo. The announcement of that deal came almost simultaneously with the signing of Burrell Grimes, former Brooklyn manager as pilot of the Montreal Club on a two-year contract.

Out of the rumor section came one that Pinky Whitney, third baseman of the Philadelphia Phillies and a 10-year man, likely would sign as manager of the Oklahoma City team.

Rumors continued that New York Giants were highly interested in obtaining either Johnny Mize or Ducky Medwick from St. Louis Cardinals.

The opening business session of the minor league is Wednesday, with Judge W. G. Branham making his annual presidential report which will strike a keynote of uniformity that will include a recommendation that all championships be awarded on the basis of games won and lost.

The recommendation would force a minor league club to drop the Snugglesey mascot as a permanent determining medium.

### Maritimes Closely Grouped In Minor League Scoring

A single point separates the first five Maritimes scorers in the International-American Hockey League, Jackie Keating of Saint John, Dodge Kuhn, once a Truro Bearcat and Sammy McManus, former Moncton Hawk, have monopolized scoring honors among the eastern provinces players in the last two years but this season they are being pressed for the leadership.

Unofficial statistics today showed Keating, now with Providence, and McManus, a member of Hershey Bears, tied for first place with nine points each. Their teams, too, are leading their respective sections.

There is a three-way tie for the second spot with Kuhn, another Rhode Island Red, sharing it with Kelly, Pitt, Sherwood, Prov. Connolly, Spring and Kuhn, Pitt, Land, Spring, and Smith, New Haven.

They have eight points apiece. Right behind them with seven points is Crosely Sherwood, Saint John boy playing for Providence.

McManus has scored the most goals with five to his credit, one more than Hudson, Steele and Sherwood while Keating leads in assists with six.

### Cowley Leads Maritime Point-getters In N.H.L.

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—(CP)—Bill Cowley, one of the National Hockey League's finest playmakers, has forged to the front in the scoring race among the circuit's Maritime representatives.

Centre for the League leading Boston Bruins, Cowley, a former Halifax Wolverine, has compiled 11 points on two goals and three assists. He has a one point margin over little Eddie Wiseman, Newcastle, N. B., native who plays for New York Americans.

Ray Gelliffe and Joffre (Zizy) Deslats, both former Saint John and Charlottetown amateurs, follow right behind. Gelliffe, another Bruin, has nine points and Deslats second leading Chicago scorer, has eight.

Other Maritime scorers are Bill (Flash) Hollett of Boston with four points and Pete Kelly of Detroit with two. Hollett used to play in the minor leagues.
