Egg And Poultry Marketing Report

There has been no change in the eggs and poultry market since last reported, states Mr. M. Nash, inspector, poultry products. The production of eggs has been steady, the demand for the product poor with the result there is some accumulation of eggs on dealers' floors, although not of a serious nature. The present difficulty is to dispose of this surplus which is surplus to our own domestic requirements on markets other than in this Province which markets are apparently showing a surplus in excess of their immediate needs.

There can be no increase in paying prices until this surplus is removed from the consuming centers in the Maritimes and Canada. In the immediate past this surplus has been assembled and removed from the market by Special Poultry Products Board which in turn disposed of it to the United Kingdom.

Previous to the inauguration of this Board, private dealers assembled surplus, placed the product in storage, returning the eggs to the Canadian markets in time of scarcity. There being no contract with the British, the Special Products Board is inoperative.

Private dealers apparently have made no move to gamble on the storing of eggs, therefore, there appears no other way to dispose of surplus eggs other than increasing the consumption of the product. The solution could be in the poultrymen themselves setting up marketing boards to effect the orderly marketing of eggs and poultry.

Operators of grading stations are quoting producers for ungraded eggs AL 22, AM 17, AP 15, B 15, C 13. Wholesalers are quoting operators of grading stations for the graded pack in new cases and trays AL 27, AM 22, AP 20, B 20, C 18. Wholesalers are quoting retailers for the graded pack loose AL 28-30, AM 25-27, AP 23-25, very few Grade B and C offering.

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL SHORT COURSES IN AGRICULTURE

JANUARY 30th to FEB. 4: Animal Husbandry and feeding. The Provincial and Federal Department of Agriculture and practical farmers will give instruction.

FEBRUARY 6th to 11: Soils, Crop Rotations and Fertilizers. Teachers from Experimental Farm and other Departments.

FEBRUARY 13-18: Horticulture, Forestry, Weeds, Special Crops, Plant Breeding, etc. Instruction by Experimental Farm and Division of Science.

FEBRUARY 20th to 25th: Insects, Plant Diseases, Parasites, Leadership, Marketing Co-operation. The Experimental Farm, Division of Science, Provincial and Federal Departments of Agriculture and Federation of Agriculture will provide instruction.

FEBRUARY 27th to MARCH 4th: Farm Accounting, Records, Health, Sanitation, Nutrition, Farm Machinery, Letter Writing, First Aid, Safety on the Highway and the Farm.

Throughout the whole course interesting and instructive films will be shown.

During the whole period it is planned to give, from time to time, instruction in the following: Rope Work, Transmission of Power, Mechanical Advantage, Tool Sharpening, Farm Mensuration, Concrete and Mortar, Painting, Farm Engineering, etc.

Farmers of all ages are welcome and those from 16 to 30 years of age who complete at least four weeks of the course will receive \$5.00 per week to assist in paying board.
