## Plant Makes Own Gas

Ethylene gas, widely used to blanch celery, to bring the glow of the color to the skins of fruit and to otherwise hasten the maturing of garden products, is actually generated by plants in the natural process of maturing for the market. Such are the indications of researches conducted by the Minnesota Agricultural Experiment Station at St. Paul by R. C. Nelson and R. B. Harvey and independently at the Low Temperature Research Station at Cambridge University, England.  
 In their experiments Nelson and Harvey used young tomato plants as "indicator" plants. The blanching effect of ethylene was produced by the celery. The leaf-stems of the latter curved downward strongly, showing that a compound with the physiological effects of ethylene was produced by the celery.  
 In a parallel test, using a non-blanching celery variety, the tomato plants did not respond, as no ethylene was being produced. Similar results were obtained in the Cambridge University experiments in which the ethylene gas was produced by ripening apples.  
 Nelson and Harvey draw attention to a practical significance of this discovery. When ethylene, best known as a constituent of natural gas, is used for the treatment of fruits and vegetables, the question was raised whether it might not possibly have harmful effects.  
 Now, they state, "since it has been shown to be produced by blanching celery under natural conditions, any fear of artificially using this gas should be removed from the minds of the public."

## Liberal Platform (Final Edition)

1. Abolition of Old Age Pensions.
2. Discontinuance of all unemployment relief and undertakings of any importance in the Public Works Department.
3. Abolition of the Department of Public Health, there being no Liberal candidate qualified to fill the portfolio.
4. Charging of gravel and road machinery to capital instead of ordinary account.
5. Reduction in all teachers' salaries of \$500 or over, in accord with the Liberal amendment to the Estimates in the Legislature in 1933.
6. Abolition of 3rd and 4th year courses at Prince of Wales College, scrapping of all oilcloth, shower baths and toilet facilities, and rebuilding the institution on a meaner scale in accord with requirements prevailing fifty years ago.
7. Provision of bicycles for Ministers, nurses, Women's Institute and departmental officials in keeping with pledge to abolish the present system of using motor cars.
8. Reduction of grants to Hospitals and Sanatorium, which the Conservatives extravagantly increased when in office.
9. Encouragement of initiative among the fishermen by abolishing the Conservative grant to the Fishermen's Union.
10. Competition being the life of trade, to establish a Central Jail Farm so as to give our farmers the benefit of competition in their home market by cutting prices, through the sale of Jail Farm vegetables.
11. Continuation of the Liberal policy of RIGID NON-COOPERATION with the other Maritime Provinces, the Maritime Board of Trade and the Transportation Commission in every matter affecting the welfare of the Province.
12. INCREASED TAXES ALL ALONG THE LINE.

**TOO MANY FOUNDINGS IN SOVIET RUSSIA**  
 MOSCOW, July 16—Soviet Russia has too many foundings, and the problem of dealing with them has become so serious that official newspapers are conducting a campaign bitterly denouncing women who give their children to foundling homes.  
 The problem arises not so much from unmarried mothers as from a desire on the part of parents to avoid responsibility of rearing children, a frequent divorce and separations have also led to an increase in unwanted babies.  
 Under the Soviet system there is no legal and little social stigma between the illegitimate child and one born in wedlock.  
 Recently a woman called at a police station with a baby which she said she had found on the staircase at her house. The child was taken from her and given to a foundling institution. Some time afterwards she called again, explained that the baby was really her own, which she wanted to be rid of because her husband had deserted her. She wanted it back again, but in the meantime it had died in the institution.

## New Coldest Spot Found

The coldest spot on earth has been moved from Verkhoyansk, in Eastern Siberia, which long boasted of its distinction, to a place called Oymyakon, also in Eastern Siberia. It is colder. Here temperatures lower than minus 102 degrees Fahrenheit prevail. Water thrown from a bucket in Oymyakon freezes before hitting the ground, and instead of splash- ing breaks according to many eye witnesses. Verkhoyansk was the only place in the world where mercury would freeze naturally.

## Pope Nearing 80th Birthday

 VATICAN CITY, July 16—Pope Pius XI has entered his 79th year, has just made the important decision to conserve his strength in every way possible, in order to give himself more years of usefulness.  
 He has now ordered the abandonment of his old custom of going from one kneeling pilgrim to another extending his papal ring for them to kiss.  
 His pontificate is already one of the longest on record, since the 261 popes only 37 reached or surpassed the length of the present one.  
 His holiness has given up completely his former custom of walking in the Vatican gardens. He goes there only by automobile, and even then only occasionally.  
 The other side of this picture is Pope Pius's mental vigor and unimpaired will. His workday would honor a man 35 years his junior.  
 Even on his 78th birthday he refused to let up, but received two archbishops, five bishops, four monsignors, a former general of the Ursuline Order, the Egyptian minister and several hundred pilgrims, besides listening to reports, signing a dozen decisions, and performing many other duties of his complicated office.

## FACTIONS CLASH ON BASTILLE DAY

 PARIS, July 16—Hundreds of thousands of men, women and children in rival political camps disputed a "dictatorship" parade today in huge Bastille day demonstrations.  
 The Nationalist veterans organization Croix De Feu and its leftist enemies led by a Socialist deputy clashed at Limoges. Several were injured.  
 After there were brief scuffles between rival factions at Dijon and Strasbourg, no body was hurt and officials said all France was calm. Leftists announced that 470,000 marched in their five-hour procession here.  
 Huge forces of police and mobile guards jammed side streets here to prevent clashes. Troops rested on their arms in barracks after the annual army review before President Albert Lebrun and members of the cabinet.  
 "Henry De La Rocque" shouted the great masses of Leftists, flaunting red emblems. They referred to Col. Francois De La Rocque, leader of the Croix De Feu.  
 Pierre Cot, former Minister of Air, French tri-ump with another tax abstrait bearing an enormous red banner, led the "popular front" forces. Among them marched former Premier Edouard Daladier, forced out of office by the 1934 riots from which today's political fervor grew.  
 Parades sang both the Internationale and Marseillaise as, nearly a score abreast, they filed the broad boulevards through the workers' section of the capital.  
 At Lyon where Edouard Herriot, as Mayor officiated at ceremonies, a school teacher climbed a statue and placed a red flag over the figure's face.  
 Above the clamor of the Communists Herriot shouted: "Down with right Fascism, down with extreme left Fascism."
