

KIDDIES PICNIC WILL BE TIME OF THEIR LIVES
Some Interesting Facts Regarding the Fairy Prince Who Has Come to Charlottetown.

A Guardian representative had the pleasure yesterday of meeting Mr. J. D. O'Connell, known all over America as the "Children's Friend." Mr. O'Connell is an interesting and entertaining conversationalist whose whole heart it is easy to see is thoroughly taken up with the great work of his life—making children happy. He started giving these picnics some twenty-five or thirty years ago, beginning in a small way or as his means would allow until now he has a total of 42 towns on his list, in the United States, Cuba, Canada and Central America. He intends adding to the list and any town which is once favored in this way will stand to be thus honored by the holding of an annual free-for-all children's picnic for all time to come. "Could anything be better than that? What more delightful way of spending money than helping poor children and making all kinds of children thoroughly happy." As stated previously a committee is always appointed beforehand in each city where an O'Connell picnic is held and the Mayor of the city is one of the trustees and to this committee is given a certain sum of money to be invested in the children's behalf and to be kept invested for all time to come. "In some cities the Mayor is the sole trustee."

"Each child in all orphanages and similar institutions will receive, as long as I live" said Mr. O'Connell, "sixty cents in cash every year. Thirty cents will be given to them at the annual picnic and thirty cents at the annual Christmas treat, which I will provide. This money is for the child to spend in any way they desire. In case of my death the picnics will go on as before but the trustees will not be bound to give a sum in cash to any child."
The amount given by Mr. O'Connell to Charlottetown for this purpose is \$5000. He gives a similar sum to Sussex his native place \$10,000 to Halifax and \$10,000 to St. John—a total of \$25,000 in the Maritime Provinces.

The age limit of children who are eligible for these picnics, said Mr. O'Connell is ten months to 100 years. 26,000 people attended one gathering in a South American town and no trouble whatever was experienced in handling the crowd.

One naturally would suppose that a great many difficulties would crop up in carrying out an undertaking of this kind but Mr. O'Connell has studied the whole thing out so thoroughly that everything goes forward with surprising smoothness and he is prepared for every eventuality.

All ladies of the city who are willing to assist in the work of preparing the several thousand bags and boxes of good things which are to be handed to the children should make it a point to be present at the K. of C. Army Hut on Dorchester Street on Thursday and Friday, the use of these premises having been kindly offered for the purpose.

Mr. O'Connell wishes it to be thoroughly understood that his work is entirely non-denominational and non-political in character.

His fondness for children is hereditary. His first actual picnic, he says, was given fifty years ago, when he was seven years old, when he used the first four cents he ever owned and which he earned, by giving a little picnic to his child companions. Mr. O'Connell seeks no notoriety in doing what he does. If the children are made happy that is all he cares about it. He says there is nothing wonderful about doing it. If any one has a sum sufficient to start doing it it is a comparatively simple matter to keep it going.

Mrs. O'Connell expects his sister Mrs. H. M. Casey of Seattle, Wash., here from Sussex on Friday night in time to attend the picnic. He went years ago to Sussex, her former home this week to meet her on her way from New York. This is the first time she has been east of the Rockies in thirty years.
