LEIPZIG, June 26.—The Imperial Supreme Court to-day convicted a former policeman named Jack Nicks, of Wilhelmshaven, on a charge of espionage and sentenced him to six years' imprisonment. Jack Nicks, with two other policemen, and a German Naval warrant officer, obtained possession of a navy signal book which they had sold to England or France. The policemen, it appears, had had a long career of robbery at Wilhelmshaven and made a specialty of training watchdogs which they sold to local merchants whose premises they afterwards burglarized being able to obtain admission owing to the dogs recognizing them.

ALBERTON, June 26.—This morning Constables George Barbour and Charles Birch recovered from a ranch near here a pair of the foxes which were stolen from the Gordon Ranch at Montrose in September, 1911. The Constables with search warrants were admitted to the ranch and after a short conversation with the owner, which implicated at least two well-known men in the theft, secured the foxes with a litter of five young ones and returned them to Mr. Gordon. It will be remembered that four foxes were stolen from the Gordon Ranch at the time. Of the two still missing it is said that one died and the other was sold to a party in the eastern part of the province. Up to a late hour last evening no arrests had been made but it is expected that some interesting developments will follow.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—An urgent desire to arm the president with a tariff "big stick" of stronger and greater proportions than was provided in the amendment suggested by the finance committee majority developed to-day in the Democratic caucus in the Senate on the Underwood tariff bill.

The discussion proposed a countervailing duty on wheat and flour which the committee recommended. This led to general debate on retaliatory and countervailing tariff rates. Senator Hoke Smith of Georgia urgently proposed the adoption of an amendment which would give the president power at any time to impose retaliatory or countervailing tariff rates on all countries which refuse reciprocity with the United States. The amendment proposed would in many respects take the place of the maximum and minimum

Company, to recover damages for the loss of his son in the Titanic disaster. The Judge awarded Ryan \$5,000, the sum agreed on, and costs. Similar award was made in two other cases at the same time.

BROCKTON, Mass., June 23.—When James L. Larkins, a Prince Edward Island fisherman scrambled aboard the Warren Line Steamship Gloucester fishing schooner, Olympia, off Sable Island, drowning six persons, he not only saved his own life but acquainted his sister, Mrs. Edward H. Walsh of 25 Bonney St. of this city, with the fact that he was still alive. They met to-day for the first time in 14 years.

For eight years Mrs. Walsh had not heard from her brother in any way. Her husband read of the collision in the Boston Globe and noticed Larkins' name in the list of the 14 sav- ed. Larkins and his twin brother, Joseph R. Larkins, went to sea when they were 15. Some years ago Joseph died. James was one of 12 chil-

OTTAWA, June 25.—A C. P. R. west-bound express was derailed this afternoon about 5 miles west of this city.

Four cars and an engine remained on the track while two cars toppled over into the Ottawa River. Two more were thrown over a landside embankment; one first class car was thrown across the tracks. The definite cause of the accident

has not yet been given.

The exact number of dead may reach 150.

The bodies of three section men have been taken from under the cars. They were crushed beyond recognition. The number of injured is very large. The train was crowded with immigrants bound for the west.
