THE LATE MR. ARCHIBALD MCKINNON'S FUNERAL—The funeral of the late Archibald McKinnon of North River, who died on Tuesday last in the 85th year of his age took place from his late residence yesterday afternoon and was very largely attended by the residents not only of the North River and adjoining settlements but from Charlottetown as well. The services at the house and grave were conducted by the Rev. D. McLean Minister of the Church of Scotland and in compliance with the request of the deceased made before his death a number of special hymns were sung. The funeral cortege as directed on the day of his death passed through his farm to the shore of North river and crossed through the farm of Mr. Alexander McKinnon to the old North River Road and thence along the road past his old homestead to Highfield Cemetery where the interment took place in the family plot. Some idea of the length of the funeral procession and the esteem in which the deceased and his family are held may be formed from the fact that as the pallbearers preceding the hearse passed through Mr. Alexander McKinnon's gate to the North River Road the end of the procession was still on the opposite side of the River. The deceased leaves surviving one son, four daughters and two sisters all of whom except one daughter reside on the Island. His wife predeceased him last August.

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Red Cross Work Goes Steadily On

The following is a letter received by Mrs. David Marshbank, President of the Alma Red Cross Society in reply to the letter which appeared in the Island Farmer a short time ago. It should be very carefully read, by especially those that are being circulated in view of hindering this great work.

Mrs. David Marshbank,
Lot 3, Alma, P. E. I.

Dear Madam—
I sympathize with you very much in your discouragement over this letter. The writer of the article evidently does not know of the existence of the National Relief Committee and of the working arrangements between the Canadian War Contingent Association by which supplies not needed by the Red Cross are handed over to the Canadian War Contingent Association for distribution amongst the men in the trenches.

I think it would be a very good thing if you would send a copy of "War Work" marked to the editor of the paper or would do so myself.

There is some difficulty in understanding the story of the doctor who speaks of the Red Cross having sent them twenty-five hundred pairs of socks, which they did not need, because the Red Cross does not send any supplies to any hospital or ambulance unless they are requisitioned or asked for by the Medical Officer or the Matron of the hospital or ambulance. If twenty-five hundred pairs of socks were sent to a Field Ambulance it was on the requisition of either the Officer or the Matron. I know that this number of socks was asked for by one of the advance Field Ambulances to be used for the men coming in from the trenches with what is called "trench foot" or sore feet. The Red Cross is able to give socks to these men as they go through the hospital, and they then go back to the trenches with warm socks.

As to the Red Cross having a "corner" on the supply of socks so that the Ordnance Department cannot get them, the idea is simply ridiculous. The Red Cross is not trying to hold supplies which it does not need. On the contrary, as I have already stated, the

WILL TELL RUSSIA OF BRITAIN'S DOINGS

PETROGRAD, Feb. 16.—A commission of prominent literary men from Russia left today for England, on the invitation of the British government, to make a tour of inspection and to observe the war work being carried out in Great Britain, in order that, on their return to Russia, they may deliver lectures to the troops and civilians, giving their impressions of the part Great Britain is really playing in the waging of the war.

The commission includes Nemirovich Danchenko, the veteran war correspondent, Ruszkostov Yegeroff, the foreign editor of the Novoe Vremya, and Count Alexis Tolstol, a leading novelist.
