Mr. Leslie McKay of the Government Steamship Brant spent the week-end at his old home in Darnley.

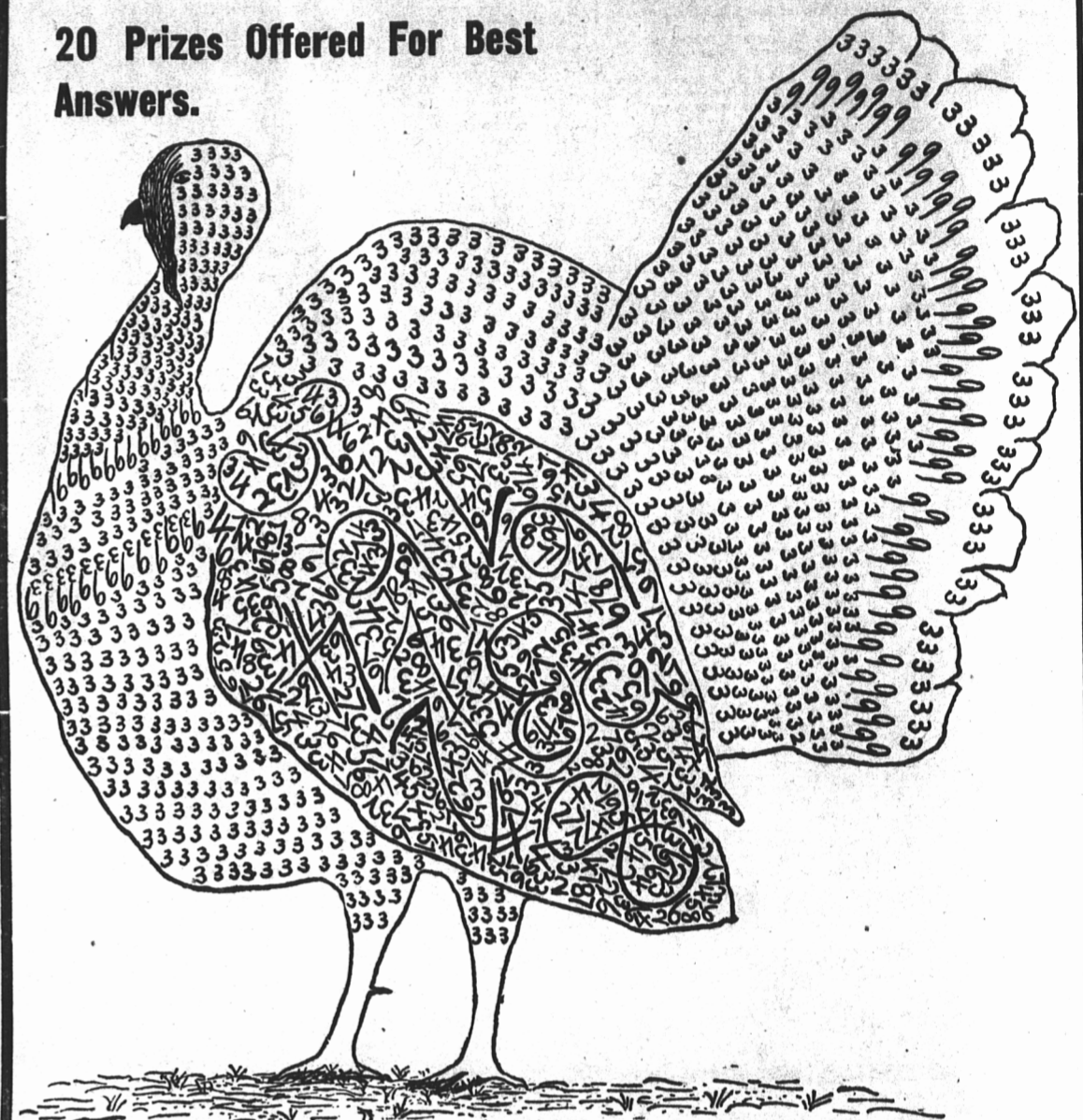
Darnley School closed for the holidays on Thursday at noon. Miss Helen Smith the teacher has resigned her position as teacher of that school.
