FORTY YEARS AGO.—On Saturday March 30th, 1878, 40 years ago tomorrow, the S. S. Northern Light, the first ice breaker built to give P. E. Island continuous communication with the mainland, crossed from Pictou to Georgetown, with no ice in sight. A summer crossing. A north east gale set in on Sunday March 31st forcing great fields of ice down against the Nova Scotia coast which on Monday April 1st was so heavy that the ice breaker, commanded by Capt. Finlayson, in endeavoring to make the crossing, became disabled. All mails were sent to the Cape where the north east gale continuing made the crossing for the ice boats so dangerous that not a boat crossed either way until Thursday April 11th twelve days without a mail to or from this Island. What would the people think if such conditions existed today? For the great privilege enjoyed today in daily crossings by the S. S. Prince Edward Island, the province is indebted largely to the late Captain Arthur Irving who probably was the first advocate of the Cape Route as the natural crossing summer and winter. Com.
