At the instance of Inspector H. A. Leslie, before D. Darrach, J. P., at Kensington Tuesday, George Abraham, an Syrian, was convicted of peddling goods without a license, and fined \$40 and costs, or two months imprisonment. Constable H. K. Moose took him to Summerside jail yesterday.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Wm. Lefurgey of Wilnot took place yesterday afternoon to the People's Cemetery, Summerside and was very largely attended. Read presented to the convention the overtures made to him by the fifth district of Prince and the personal advantages, of representing a home district, yet he would not insist on his acceptance from "the old fort." The delegates however would take no other candidate and to the great satisfaction Capt. Read accepted the nomination for the fourth district. Hon. S. E. Reid also accepted the nomination.

The Liberal convention for the first district of Prince held in Ludlow Hall Summerside yesterday afternoon was largely attended, B. A. poles being fully represented. B. A.
