Deposits In P. O. Savings Banks Show Big Slump

OTTAWA, March 5.—Answers by Hon. P. J. Veniot, Postmaster General to questions placed on the Order Paper of the House of Commons by H. E. Spencer, (U.F.A. Battle River) indicate a steady decrease in deposits in the Post Office Savings Bank. The figures are as follows:

1924, \$7,118,912; 1925, \$4,089,059; 1926, \$3,508,288; 1927, \$3,178,563 and 1928, \$3,090,163.

The highest interests ever paid was four percent. This was reduced in 1889 to 3 1-2 percent and in 1897 to 3 percent. There are at present 1,355 post offices in which savings deposits may be made.

The number of post offices where the postmaster or postmistress is receiving over \$300 a year in salary is given as 5,900.

Famous Vessel To Be Broken Up

LONDON, March 9.—The Lady Brussels, the vessel immemorably associated with the death of Captain Fryatt, is to be broken up. She is at present lying in Preston Dock, and for some time until recently was on the Preston to Dublin passage.

During the war her route was between Harwich and the Hook of Holland, when she was under the command of Captain Fryatt. In 1915 Captain Fryatt evaded capture by attempting to ram an enemy submarine. For that deed he was presented with a gold watch by the railway company.

In 1916 the Brussels was captured by German destroyers, and in July of that year, Captain Fryatt was court-martialled at Bruges and shot at the same camp in which Nurse Cavell was executed. The chief item of evidence against him was the inscription in the watch, marking his earlier feat.

The Brussels was left alongside the Mole at Zeebrugge and used as a seaplane depot ship and during the famous British raid in 1918, she was repeatedly hit by the raiders' gunfire. After the raid the Germans stripped her of all brass and copper fittings and sunk her at the outer entrance with other vessels, to prevent further raids.

For three years the Brussels lay submerged, and the end of 1920 she was salvaged and taken to Leith. Subsequently she was bought by the Dublin and Lancashire Shipping Co., refitted as a cattle steamer, and placed on the Dublin and Preston route.
