NEW CLINIC ASSURES SEAMEN HEALTH PLAN

VANCOUVER, Jan. 19 — (CP)—From now on, Vancouver mariners will go to sea in better health. The Deep-sea Shipowners' Association has established a new seaman's clinic, providing free examination and medical advice for all deep-sea mariners signing on here. Under present regulations seamen may obtain free medical treatment only when they are registered as crew members of a ship. Ship-

owners hope the present clinic can be more closely related with their new examination clinic to provide an overall health plan for mariners at sea and ashore.

Says Canol Property Has Disappeared

(By The Canadian Press) VANCOUVER, Jan. 17—The Vancouver Daily Province said today in a dispatch from Norman Wells, N. W. T., at least \$100,000,000 worth of Canol Oil Project property "has mysteriously disappeared." "The one good asset which now remains of Canol stands at Whitehorse, Y. T., in the form of the refinery which cost \$25,000,000," the dispatch said.

It was announced in Washington this week the United States Government now proposes to sell the assets of Canol, which cost \$133,000,000. The Province dispatch said: "Canol's ribs have been picked by junk dealers and its skeleton on the open market will not likely bring one-tenth of its cost." Apart from the refinery, most that remains is a great collection of broken-down bulldozers, wrecked trucks, a great many motor cars, and a fleet of river craft, most of it not seaworthy, the Province claimed.

WAR-TIME RESTRICTIONS LIFTED ON PURCHASE, POSSESSION, AND USE OF EXPLOSIVES

An Order in Council passed under authority of the War Measures Act in 1940 to regulate the sale, possession, and use of explosives was repealed on December 23rd, 1946, according to an announcement by the Hon. J. Allison Glen, Minister of Mines and Resources. With the repeal of this war-time regulation, Explosives Purchase Permits will no longer be required and farmers, prospectors and contractors who formerly had to obtain permits from Police authorities may now purchase explosives without a permit.



First Canadian Citizenship certificates in the French tongue were awarded. Mayor Camillien Houde, colorful figure of Quebec politics received the No. 1 certificate in French from the court, after welcoming both the court and the guests to the ceremony.

The Order in Council just repealed exercised a vital control over the purchase and possession of explosives and its value as a security measure is unquestioned. Although millions of pounds of explosives were used in Canada during the war years not a single case of sabotage involving commercial explosives has been reported.

Over one hundred and thirty-five thousand permits were issued in the six years that the regulation was in force and much credit is due to Police authorities and mine inspectors who assumed the responsibility of issuing permits. One of the important provisions of the war-time regulation was to prohibit the sale of explosives except by vendors who were owners or operators of licensed factories, and licensed magazines. It has been deemed wise to continue some measure of control over the sale of explosives and the Explosives Act, 1946 and Regulations made thereunder now prescribes the conditions of sale. Enquiries regarding the regulations should be addressed to the Chief Inspector of Explosives, Bureau of Mines, Department of Mines and Resources, Ottawa.
