NEW ANTI-INFLUENZA SERUM USED IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, March 3.—A new anti-influenza serum is now being used by Colonel Bridges, A. D. M. S., and the medical officers of M. D. 4 as a preventative, not only of the influenza itself, but chiefly of the pneumonic diseases and lung abscesses, which have proved more fatal than the influenza. This is a serum known as the Polyvalent Serum, and it is administered subcutaneously. Colonel Bridges said that he had used this serum at the military camp in England last year, and had also been inoculated himself, and he felt confident that in its use with the troops at the Peel Street barracks had resulted in stemming what might have been an unpleasant outbreak of flu.

Blizzard Hits Mountain And Plains States

CHICAGO, March 4.—The worst storm of the winter today swept eastward from the Mountain and Plains States, where yesterday it reached blizzard proportions. A number of towns in Colorado, Nebraska and South Dakota were reported isolated and rail, and wire communication in Kansas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Iowa, Arkansas, North Texas and Minnesota was seriously crippled.

The disturbance will spread rapidly east and south today and tonight, according to Weather Bureau forecasts, carrying sharply reduced temperatures with snow and rain.

Most of the interference with railroad traffic reported early today was in the Mountain States and South Dakota and Minnesota, while telegraph and telephone lines suffered badly from sleet in the other sections hit by the storm. In the mountains damage to railroads from slides and boulders toppling over on the tracks could not be estimated, railroad men said.

In the La Plata mining district in Colorado, where snow was reported 12 to 20 feet deep, a repetition of the serious floods of nine years ago was feared. It would be several days before isolated towns in Colorado again would have rail, road communication with the outside world, it was said. Durango has been cut off ten days, and Silverton twelve days.

St. Paul and Minneapolis, Minnesota, reported heavy snow, and street car traffic badly handicapped, and similar reports came from Duluth and Superior at the head of the lakes, Duluth adding that the entire iron range was snowed in.

SLAUGHTER OF GREEKS AND ARMENIANS BY TURKS

PARIS, March 3.—The Greek legation today made public a telegram announcing the slaughter of a large number of Greeks and Armenians by the Turks in Rodosto, 60 miles northeast of Gallipoli in the Sea of Marmora. Details are lacking but the telegram says that the French government of Delcandegh, a seaport in Thrace on the Aegean Sea, has left hurriedly for Enos, the headquarters of the followers of Mustafa Kemal Pasha, Turkish nationalist leader, who are said to be terrorizing the inhabitants of that region.

ONTARIO FARMER SHOT AND KILLED BY BROS-IN-LAW

COOKSVILLE, ONT., March 3.—James Davidson, a farmer of this village, was shot and killed this afternoon while visiting his brothers-in-law, Frank and Joseph Larson, and Frank Larson, was arrested on a charge of murder. His brother Joseph and his father Nelson Larson are being held as material witnesses. The prisoners were taken to Brampton jail. The murder was the outcome of a quarrel. A shotgun was used and part of Davidson's skull was blown off by the force of the charge. It is said no attempt was made by any of the men concerned in the tragedy to get away. The trio hung around the farm where the killing had taken place until arrested.

JOHN T. MULLIN

John T. Mullin, one of the best known residents of Kensington died at his home there on Friday night after a protracted illness. He had enjoyed excellent health up to a few months ago. He was attended in his last days by the Pastor, Rev. Mr. D. J. Ellis, who fortified his soul by the strengthening influences of the last sacrament. He breathed forth his soul to God perfectly conscious of the dreaded ordeal through which man must pass and piously confident in the hope of salvation merited from a merciful Redeemer. He was a man widely known and popular wherever he went. He was characterized by the possession of commendable energy and a strength of will that made energy effective. He was industrious to a degree that severely tried the physical man and accomplished beneficial results. An active part he took in church, school, and civil affairs, and his work was always productive of good results.

He was born on the homestead at Kensington in 1846 and lived here continuously, except one year he spent in California. His funeral was held on Feb. 29, and was attended by many sorrowing friends. 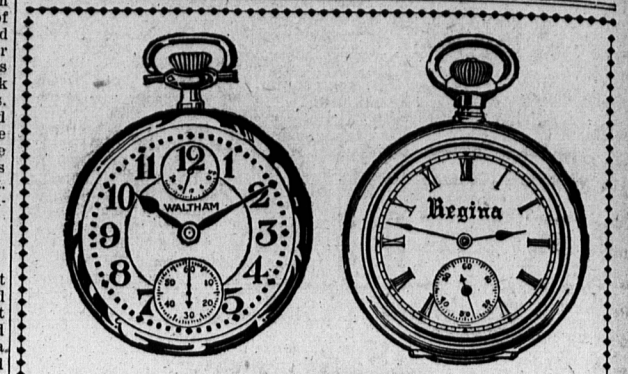
ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION.

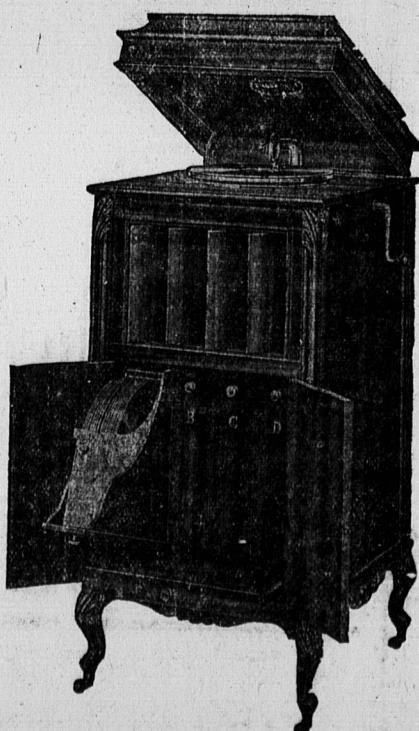

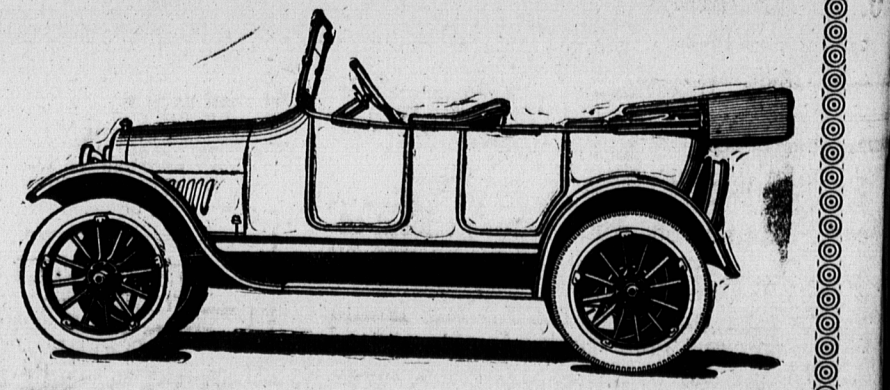
