200 Japanese Students Drowned Off Korea Coast

(Canadian Press) TOKIO, April 27.—Two hundred Korean students were drowned off the west coast of Korea near Chinnampo when a steamship taking them for a visit to Japanese destroyers anchored off the shore collided with one of the destroyers and capsized according to despatches received from Seoul.

The steamer sank quickly owing to the rough seas and only a small number of the students could be rescued.

Boston Reports a Record Fish Catch

Police of Moscow Round up More Than 50 Youthful Terrorists.

(Canadian Press) MOSCOW, April 27.—An attack by a gang of toughs, all aged between 12 and 17, they have been terrorizing inhabitants of the city for months. In nearly every case their victim was followed to the edge of the Moscow River, and as he was about to cross the ice was stabbed in the back. He was then robbed and carried to the hiding place on the outskirts of the city, where he was left to die.

Fell 100 Feet and Lived to Tell About it

(Canadian Press) GENEVA, April 27.—Five Swiss Alpinists met with a terrible experience on the frozen summit of a mountain, Les Roches Pleureuses, on the Swiss-French frontier. The leader of the party suddenly became dizzy, and was unable to move backward or forward. His comrades attempted to rescue him by forming a chain with joined hands. The living chain, however, broke, and four men fell 100 feet into a partially frozen river. One of the Alpinists was nearly drowned, but finally the five reached a village nearby in an exhausted condition.

Discover a Plot To Oust French Government

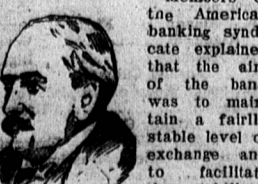
(Canadian Press) PARIS, April 27.—Reports of a plot to overthrow the present government and establish a republic in Bulgaria have been received in Paris. The movement was organized by prominent Agrarians, followers of the murdered Premier Stamboliski. The Government in an official account of the discovery of the plot, states that nearly all those concerned are under lock and key.

Would Give Vote to Women of Greece

(Canadian Press) ATHENS, April 27.—The Republican Premier, M. Papanastasiou, replying to an address by "The Women's Little Entente"—an association aiming at the promotion of women's rights in the countries of South-Eastern Europe Poland and Czechoslovakia, stated that he viewed this movement with great satisfaction, as being likely to strengthen friendly relations with Greece's neighbors. As regards the political enfranchisement of women in Greece, he said that the Republican party would introduce it gradually, beginning as soon as possible with the concession of the municipal franchise to women.

GERMAN BANKS TO RECEIVE UNLIMITED CREDIT FROM U.S.

American Bankers Will Advance Millions of Dollars to Aid in Economic Rehabilitation of Central Nations

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, April 27.—Establishment of unlimited credit facilities by United States bankers for the new German gold rediscout bank, organized by Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, was announced today by the International Acceptance Bank of New York. An initial advance of \$5,000,000 has been made re-opening trade channels between the United States and Germany which virtually have been closed, since the collapse of the German Currency. Extension of the credit marks the first actual participation of United States capital in the economic rehabilitation of Germany. Funds will be used to rediscout Germany two-name trade bills, issued in dollars and payable in the United States.

GERMAN BANKS TO RECEIVE UNLIMITED CREDIT FROM U.S.

No restrictions were placed on the amount of money which might be drawn for this purpose, because it was expected the temporary need would be removed within a year or two by the consolidation of the Schacht institution with the gold bank proposed in the Dawes plan. Twenty leading financial institutions of New York, Boston and Chicago are members of the syndicate which has placed the credit at the disposal of German banks. They include the National City Bank, Guaranty, The First National Bank and the Old Colony Trust Company, of Boston, and The Illinois Merchants Trust Company, of Chicago. The Schacht rediscout bank, capitalized at 10,000,000 pounds, half of which is supplied by the Bank of England, was organized to buy from German bonds trade bills issued in Sterling dollars. Sterling bills are rediscouted in London through an operation similar to the one opened here.

PARIS, April 27.—The presence of J. P. Morgan in Paris is causing a considerable flutter in French political and financial quarters. From persons who have talked with him it is learned that his position regarding an international loan for Germany has been clearly explained to M. Barthou, Sir John Bradbury, M. Robineau and others. He is understood to have said in effect that the details of such a loan could not be discussed at present and that only general principles could be considered.

Five Liners Carry 913 For Halifax

HALIFAX, April 27.—Five ocean liners are expected here within a few days with about 913 passengers to land at this port. The first ship expected is the White Star liner Celtic, due early tomorrow morning. She will be followed during the day by the President Wilson, of the Cosulich line from Italian ports and the R. M. S. P. liner Arbuta. On Sunday the Cunard liner Saxonia will arrive from Hamburg via Southampton and Cherbourg, and on Tuesday the North German Lloyd steamer Yorok is due from Bremen.

FLIER FORCED TO EARTH
