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THE COOK'S CORNER

DATE CUSTARD

One pound golden dates washed, stoned and soaked over night in just enough water to cover them. In the morning place them in a dish in the water in which they have been soaked and cook for a few minutes, cool and sift through a colander. Beat three eggs slightly, add 1 pint warm milk and a few grains salt, mix well, and add to the dates. Place in a buttered baking dish, set in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven until custard is set. Allow to cool slowly, then place in refrigerator. Serve cold with whipped cream to which has been added a few gratings of orange rinds.

BROILED LAMB KIDNEYS WITH BACON

Clean kidneys and cut in half. Marinate overnight in French dressing. Wrap each kidney in a slice of bacon and bake in a hot oven or broil until bacon is crisp and kidneys are tender: about twenty minutes in the oven or twelve to fifteen minutes under the broiler. Lay kidneys on triangles of toast and serve at once.

CURRIED VEAL

Cut in 1-inch cubes about 1 1/2 pounds of stewing veal, discarding all skin and gristle. Sear in a hot pan with a little butter, allow to brown nicely, stirring to prevent scorching. Remove meat, add a little flour, about 2 tablespoons, and enough boiling water to make a

You can use the pattern again for a separate blouse or a sun-back dress.

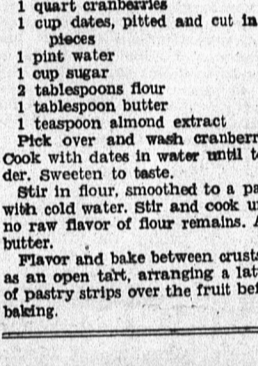
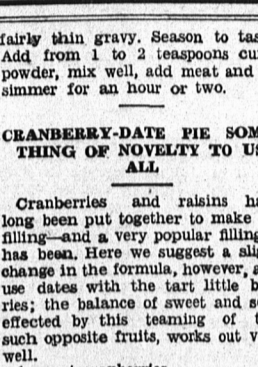
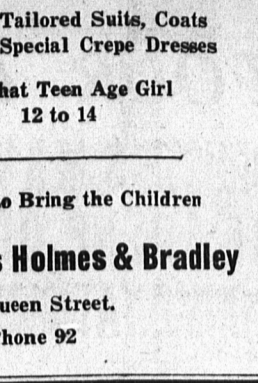
