SORTIE FROM LADYSMITH

British Capture Big Gun on Lombard's Kop.

A BIG BATTLE MUST BE FOUGHT

All the British Columns Advancing—Gen. White Sends Gen. Buller a Map by Pidgeon Post—The Boer Camps in Natal Located—The British Now on Boer Soil.

ORANGE RIVER, Cape Colony, Dec. 9.—(Special).—Canadian Contingent were here on Wednesday, all well and ready to move forward to assist Lord Methuen.

Orange River, is approximately 50 miles in rear of Methuen's position at Modder River.

CANADIANS WILL SOON SEE BATTLE.

Old officers say the Canadian Contingent are rapidly getting fit and their association with old and tried regiments is having a marked effect on the morale of the men.

Nobody knows when the advance of the Canadians will be made, but the officers think the corps will soon receive its baptism of fire.

THE BIG GUN AT LADYSMITH CAPTURED

LONDON Dec. 9.—(Special).—The troops from Ladysmith on Friday made a sortie and carried the hill of Lombard's Kop, immediately north of town after a hard fight.

They destroyed the Boer big gun and howitzer with dynamite and captured a small maxim.

The Boer loss is not known.

FRENCH ADVANCING ON COLESBURG.

The British under Gen. French Naauwput are advancing on Colesburg supported by an armored train.

HEAVY BATTLES NEAR AT HAND.

The howitzers for Generals Methuen and Buller have reached the front and news of heavy battles is expected early next week in which the British will be better armed than at any time since the war commenced.

WHITE SENDS BULLER A MAP.

Gen. White has sent to Gen. Buller by pidgeon post a map, showing the Boer positions about Ladysmith, their weak points, etc.

BOERS SHELLING LADYSMITH HOSPITAL.

The bombardment of Ladysmith continues daily and the Boers deliberately fired on the town hall.

They knew it was used as a hospital, but blazed away, wounding twelve hospital orderlies.

GETTING READY TO RETREAT.

The Boers, while preparing to make a big onslaught on Ladysmith, are also getting provisions together for a hasty retreat, in case of emergency.

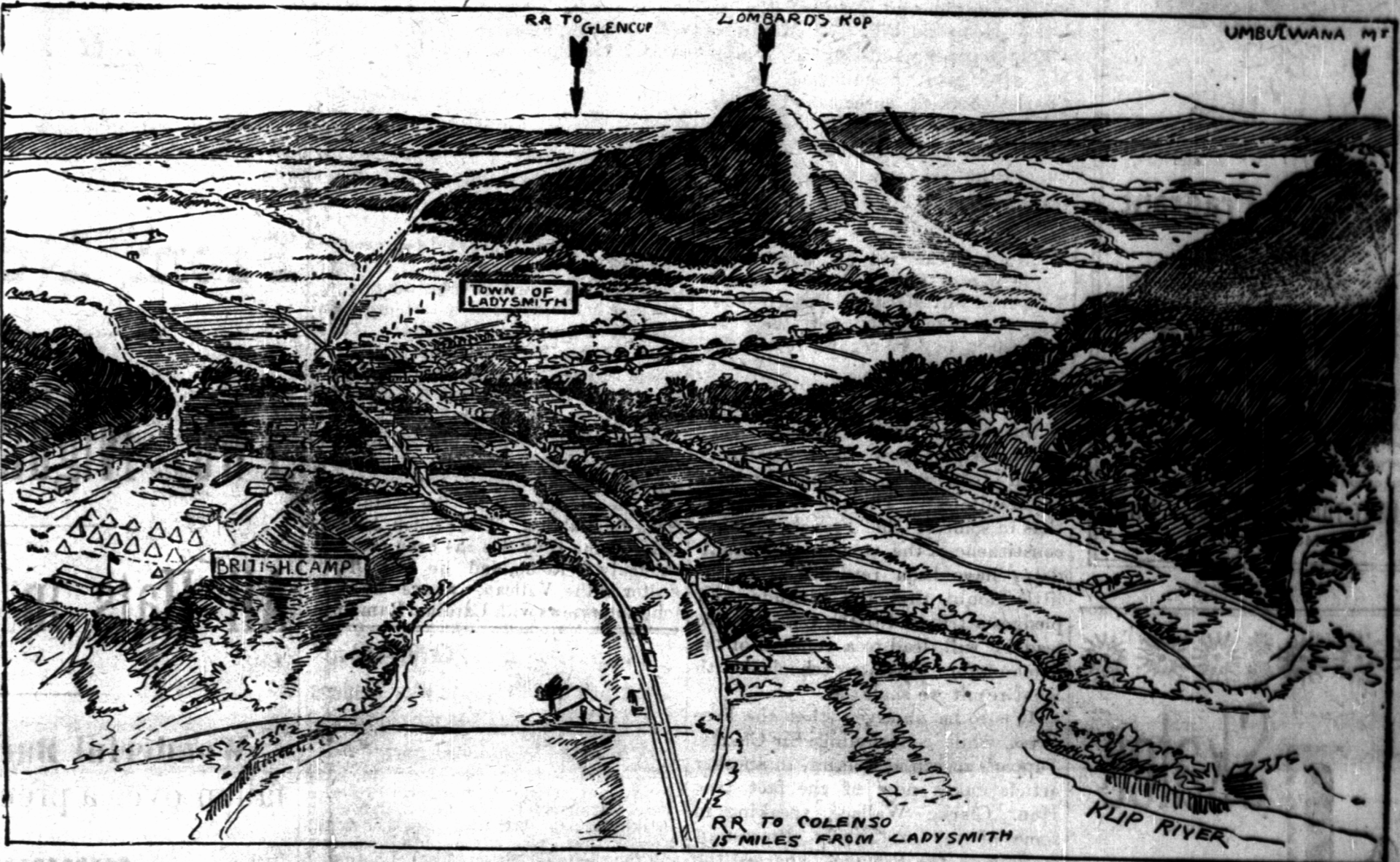

FIGHTING ON BOER SOIL.

The British are now on Boer soil. Gen. Methuen has turned to the eastward. His plan may be to threaten Bloemfontein thus avoiding battle a Spoffstein, draw the Boers from Kimberly and do the necessary fighting in the open country more favourable to the British.

CRISIS OF THE CAMPAIGN—A GENERAL ADVANCE.

The crisis of the campaign is now reached.

Simultaneous aggressive advances are now being made against the Boers from East, South and West by Gens. Buller, Gatacre and Methuen respectively, and news of heavy fighting is momentarily expected.

BOERS ENTRENCHED AT SPYTFONTEIN.

Nearly the whole Boer force in the neighborhood of Methuen is strongly entrenched midway between the Modder River and Kimberly, ready to make the last stand against General Methuen's advance to the relief of the beleaguered city.

If General Methuen would give battle then it would undoubtedly prove the bloodiest fight of the war.

BOER CAMP IN NATAL LOCATED

A despatch from Freere Camp says the British have now accurately located all the Boer camps in the vicinity of Colenso.

The positions occupied are of great natural strength.

WHERE THE HEAVIEST FIGHTING WILL BE

The place where the heaviest fight will certainly occur is a large entrenched position near Fort Wylie, where the Boers are in great force.

SIX MEN'S AWFUL FALL

Big Canadian Knitting Trust—Singular Case of Broken Neck.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 9.—(Special).—The latest advices show 16 Government and 22 Opposition members elected.

Some returns are still incomplete, but Avondale, Souris, Emerson, Woodlands and Saskatchewan go Conservative and Carillon and Beautiful Plains Liberal.

Y. M. C. A. Meeting.

A large audience filled the auditorium of the First Methodist Church yesterday evening, at the close of the regular services. Mr. J. D. Samaan, President of the Association, presided and referred briefly to the need of active Christian work on behalf of the young men of the city.

In short, and stirring addresses Rev. Messrs. Teasdale, Raymond and McConnell discussed the aims of the Association and the present condition of the Charlottetown Association.

Excellent music was provided by a united choir from the different churches under the efficient leadership of Prof. Watts.

Mr. Fraser G. Marshall, General Y. M. C. A. Secretary, delivered a practical address dealing with the Y. M. C. A. and its relation to the young men of Canada. He said that the Y. M. C.
