8,000 Miles In 23 Ft Boat

BATH, Me., Oct. 27.—Manuel Blossa Cruz, 26, set sail from here today in a 23-foot sloop on an 8,000 mile voyage to his native village of Puntas Arenas, Chile.
He attempted the same trip last year and was picked up 23 miles off Cape Hatteras, N. C., by the passenger steamer Somerset after drifting 48 hours in his sinking boat.
He carried no charts and expected to depend on the stars, dead reckoning and what information he could hail from passing ships to shape his course.

SHEIK LAUNDRYMAN CAUGHT

Sadek Abbas Hussein, chief of a marauding band of Bedouin Arabs, is back again in prison at Beyrouth, Syria, and Syrian authorities are resting peacefully once more while the famous horseman and marksman starts again to serve a sentence of 20 years. Feared for his surprise attacks on travelers between Syria and Palestine, Hussein was captured by a desert patrol and sentenced to 20 years in Beyrouth prison. He escaped and made his way to Alexandria, Egypt, where he opened a laundry. Business grew, and Hussein prospered and registered happiness. But Syria had appealed to the Palestine and Egyptian authorities to watch for the sheik, and an Egyptian policeman made the arrest, thus stamping the laundryman disguise as a complete "wash-out."

Fiji Islanders Go To Work

Refuting reports that the natives of the Fiji Islands are so lazy that they refuse to work, many of them have started to raise sugar. Hon. Islay McOwan, C. M. G., the Secretary for Native Affairs, said in an interview at Suva that the experiments with the native farmer were proving very satisfactory. The Colonial Sugar Company had given a number of them plots, ploughs and bullocks also seed to plant cane, and the natives had already supplied cane to the sugar mills, with good results to themselves. Many others were being trained at both the government and mission farms, and were quickly adapting themselves to the new conditions. Several groups had done this, although they had to make provision to maintain their old folks at home and others less fortunate.
