**THE VETERANS BOUNTY.**  
OTTAWA, June 23—An order in council published setting forth the regulations under which the \$100 bounty is to be paid to veterans of 1867-70. The application must be accompanied by a legal delegation, giving the name of the corps, time and place of service and the name of the commanding officer. The applicant must state that he has not applied before and should furnish a declaration from a comrade, identifying him as having served. As far as possible all claims are to be verified from departmental records, the presence of claimants name on the payroll or on the annual drill pay list of a corps called out in the war, being sufficient claims which cannot be thus verified, are to be passed upon a board of officers, appointed by the minister.

**FIRE AT LAGGAN.**  
CALGARY, Alta., June 22—With a thousand men fighting back a fierce wall of flames that at one time threatened to devour the Canadian Pacific Railway hotel, the mountain townsite of Laggan was almost wiped out of existence last night. So great was the damage that calls for help were sent to Calgary, Alberta, and fire fighters to the scene on flat cars.  
The latest reports are that the fire is slowly burning itself out. The C. P. R. hotel at Laggan, has accommodation for 700 guests and cost half a million dollars.

**CANADIAN LABOR LAW.**  
LONDON, June 22—Premier Asquith receiving a deputation from the Associated Chambers of Commerce, said he was unaware of how far the Canadian labor law made compulsory an investigation before a strike or lockout became possible, but he intended having a careful enquiry made into the working of the Canadian law and seeing if it could be adopted here.



MONCTON, June 24—Thieves are not waiting very long for one's place of business to be open before they make an attempt at robbery. The police were notified of the occurrence and are working on the case, but no arrests have been made.

**\$12,500 VERDICT.**  
BOSTON, Mass., June 22—Jogging along a country road with a horse and carriage and racing two automobiles created widely different situations as regards the amount of care required of the drivers, according to the full bench of the Supreme Judicial Court, which handed down a decision Thursday affirming Michael L. Cressy's verdict of \$12,500 against William M. Tayer and George M. Farrigan for injuries sustained in an accident. A verdict of \$8,000 in favor of J. Everett Brown, an administrator of Richard Brown, for the death of the latter, is set aside for the reason that under the statute separate actions for death should have been brought against each defendant.

**MOTORMAN DRUNK.**  
BOSTON, Mass., June 22—Eighteen persons were injured, four men were arrested and a lynching was narrowly averted at the corner of Washington and Northampton streets shortly before 11 o'clock Thursday night, following a collision between two surface cars, due, according to the police, to the fact that the motorman was intoxicated.  
John Smith, a non-union motorman, who gave his address as the Forest Hills car barn, the motorman of the Dudley street car which crashed into an Ashmont and Milton car, was arrested charged with being drunk, after a chase that extended for a number of blocks down Washington street, together with John Dully, the motorman of the Ashmont car, who gave his address as 7 Greenwich park.
