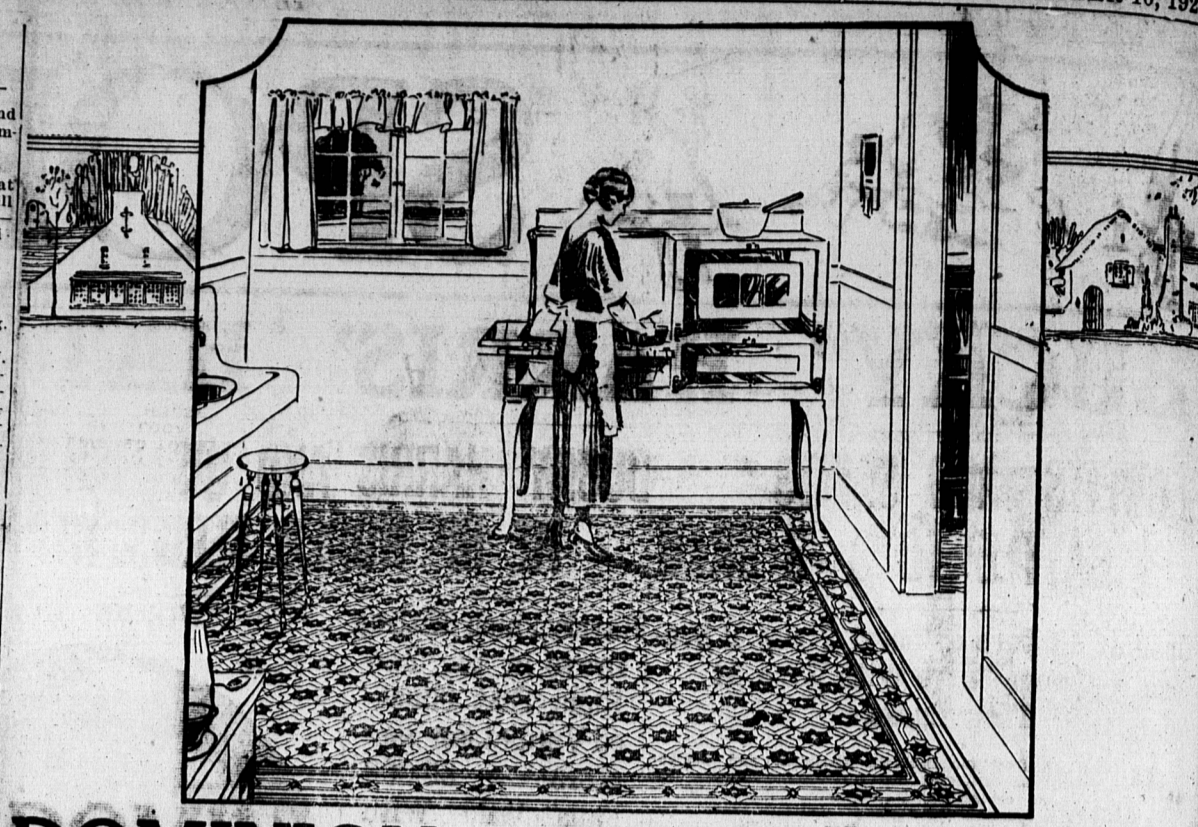

Kaiser's Maid Slays Three

BERLIN, Oct. 9.—Contact with former Kaiser Wilhelm did not improve the moral precepts of Marie Kruger, for two years his personal housemaid. Frau Kruger has just been arrested on the charge of murdering three of her husbands, after a sensational career as international adventuress which she has followed since leaving the all highest's employ.

Her first husband, wealthy and of advanced age, died from poisoning, after the wife had failed to drown him by hiring a young man to overturn a boat in which he was riding. Poison also was used on the second husband. Two attempts were necessary. The third victim died when his throat was cut by a razor.

After leaving the silded life of Potsdam and Berlin, when her master was overthrown, Frau Kruger posed as a courtesan, travelling through Austria, Switzerland and other countries. Convicted of fraud, she was sentenced to jail in Hamburg. Her intensive matrimonial career began after her release from prison.

Is Jailed On Eve Of Wedding

ROCHESTER, N. H., Oct. 9.—Today was the date set for the wedding of Albert Daigle of Somersworth to a well-known Rochester young woman, in St. Mary's Church but instead of listening to the strains of "The Wedding March" and receiving on a honeymoon, Daigle is tonight locked up in jail in the York County jail at Alfred, Me., while the wedding has been postponed indefinitely.

Daigle is a well-known barber in Somersworth. He made the acquaintance of the Rochester young woman and their friendship ripened into love. He proposed, was accepted, and the date set for the wedding. Bridesmaids were selected and announcements sent out to relatives and friends.

Then the law upset plans of the prospective bride and groom. About two years ago, it is alleged, Daigle was arrested near Wells, Me., for a violation of the prohibition law. He gave \$500 bonds for his appearance in court, but when the time came for the trial, he failed to appear and forfeited his bonds. Since then the Maine authorities have been looking for him.

Last week, it is said, Daigle thoughtlessly went across the bridge from Somersworth into Berwick, Me., and was promptly arrested by a deputy sheriff and taken to the Alfred jail.

Tonight at the jail Mrs. Lester R. Garvin, wife of the jailer, told the Post reporter that Daigle would be there two months, and if he did not pay his fine, possibly eight months.

\$10,000 For 'Sunlight Lamp' Test

BOSTON, Oct. 9.—For the purpose of further research with the newly-discovered "sunlight lamp," under the direction of Dr. W. T. Bovie, the Boston City Council yesterday passed unanimously an appropriation for \$10,000, which was requested by the Boston Conservation Bureau and recommended by Mayor Curley.

The money will be used for erecting a "greenhouse" or laboratory in Huntington avenue, near the Harvard biological laboratory, and for equipping the same. Here Professor Bovie, one of the most eminent scientists of the country, who is a member of the medical committee of the city's conservation bureau, will continue his experiments, which so far have proved so successful.

Mr. Douglass Flattery, chairman of the bureau, explained to the council that Professor Bovie in cooperation with scientists of the General Electric Company has employed the newly discovered synthetic quartz glass in perfecting a lamp which in the treatment of rickets, tuberculosis and some skin diseases has been unusually successful.

Similar lamps, he declared, will be available for hospital use in a short time. It has been found, he said, that applications of "sunlight"

Rural Comment

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.—Our rural correspondents in all the eastern provinces report that the balance of the oat crop, which was difficult to harvest on account of so much rain, has finally been harvested, and that the principal pursuit of the farmer, getting ready for fall ploughing, getting ready for the next year.

In addition to this, in Ontario some of the late crops are being harvested. These include potatoes and roots, and silo filling with corn is commencing also, especially in those districts which have already been struck by heavy frosts. The cereal harvest is reported to be equally as good as that of last year in Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, 20 per cent less in New Brunswick, 30 per cent larger in Quebec, and 25 per cent smaller in Ontario. The hay crop is stated to be equal to that of last year in quality, but much poorer in quantity.

The demand for feeding stuffs by farmers is given as stronger than two weeks ago, and this demand is expected to continue with gaining strength as the season advances.

Fall wheat seeding in Ontario is completed, and fertilizer sales for this autumn are about over.
