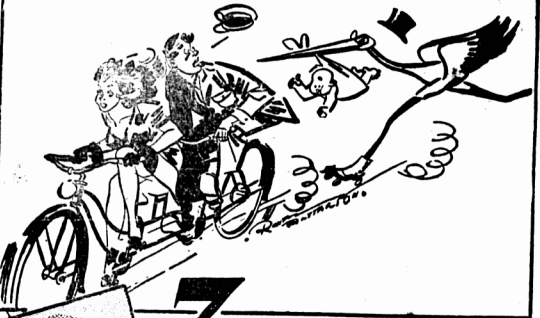

Reorganization Of Curricula In Schools Advocated

At Thursday's meeting of the local Advisory Committee on Employment and Selective Service the following statement was read: "Presenting a resolution prepared by a New Brunswick committee headed by Dr. Fletcher Fenwick, Superintendent of Education for that Province, urging a reorganization of the school setup to provide technical training in all the major trades. The text of the resolution appeared in yesterday's Guardian."

Untrained Youth "It is not reasonable to expect that this flood of immature, untrained, uneducated youth coming into the employment market each year is seriously affecting our economic stability? And have we not good reason for placing the blame on our school system?"

Trade Teaching Technique "It is the opinion of the resolution that the present system in any way hindering the opportunity for a pupil to get a university technical college education, should be able to do so."

MR. MONTGOMERY'S CAREER - Mr. Charles T. Montgomery, whose appointment as Superintendent of the Prince Edward Island division, C.N.R., in succession to Mr. E. W. In March, 1923, he was promoted to chief clerk to the superintendent of transportation and in December of the same year was transferred to Moncton as inspector, returning to Moncton as assistant to the general superintendent of transportation in May, 1924. In August, 1926 he was appointed assistant superintendent of the New Glasgow division. May, 1928 superintendent and on Nov. 15, 1943, was appointed superintendent of the Moncton division.
