### Important Judgment In Auto Case

IN THE COUNTY COURT OF QUEEN'S  
The 31st. day of March 1925.  
James C. Montgomery vs. Ellsworth Diamond  
This is an action brought by the plaintiff claiming damages against the defendant arising out of a collision occurring between the plaintiff and defendant's automobile on the corner of Queen and Richmond Streets in Charlottetown on the 18th. of August last. The uncontradicted evidence of the plaintiff shows that in the collision his car was injured and damaged to the amount of \$116.25. The plaintiff was proceeding on the right side of Queen Street in the day time intending to pass Richmond Street which intersects Queen at right angles. As he approached where Richmond Street crossed Queen the defendant was coming down Queen in his car on the right side of the street. The evidence shows that when the defendant arrived in front of the door of the Royal Bank building on the corner of Queen and Richmond Streets, and desiring to take his course eastwardly into Richmond Street, he cut his car diagonally across the street. At the same time the plaintiff's car was heading up on the right side of Queen Street and as it reached about half way across Richmond Street the defendant's car coming right on him from the west side of Queen Street, and believing that with collision and consequent serious damage were inevitable he promptly turned his car to the left in order to escape the defendant's oncoming car, and in this he no doubt would have succeeded had not the defendant evidently at the same time in order to prevent his car from striking the plaintiff's turned his car to his right, thus bringing about the very thing which the both were trying to avoid. Two things appear quite clearly from the evidence. (a) If the defendant with the plaintiff going to the left had not turned his car to the right there would have been no collision. (b) If the plaintiff with the defendant at the last moment steering his car to the right had not turned his car to his left but proceeded on up Queen Street as he was going, both cars would have escaped undamaged. As it happened, both cars struck each other, doing considerable damage for which to the plaintiff's car this action has been taken. The preponderance of evidence is that the collision took place two or three feet to the east of the centre of Queen Street and about at a point where the prolongation of the north curb of Richmond Street extending from the Market Square westwardly would reach Queen Street at this point is 45 feet wide from curb to curb. The door of the Royal Bank is 25 feet north of the north curb of Richmond Street at the Royal Bank corner and Richmond Street at this corner is 21 feet wide from curb to curb. The defendant therefore instead of proceeding down the west side of Queen Street and across Richmond Street to within three or four feet of the south curb, thereof before turning his car eastward to enter Richmond Street, as he should have done, began the diagonal cut across when he was 46 feet distant from the south curb of Richmond Street. In this he was acting with slight regard to consequences and clearly negligent. The driving of automobiles, on account of their speed, size and power, is attended with greater danger than is the movement of horse drawn vehicles and a driver of the former must use greater precautions and diligence than a driver of the latter.

The solution of this case hinges upon the answer to the question: Was there contributory negligence on the part of the plaintiff? Contributory negligence involves not only a finding of negligence, but of such negligence that but for it the accident would not have happened.

The following legal propositions are deducible from cases dealing with the question of contributory negligence. (a) If notwithstanding the defendant's negligence the plaintiff with reasonable care could have avoided the injury he cannot sue the defendant.

Buttfield vs. Forrester 11 East 60 (b) If notwithstanding the plaintiff's negligence the defendant with reasonable care could have avoided injuring the plaintiff the latter can sue the defendant.

Although there is a duty imposed upon every person using the highway to observe the rules of the road the law will not excuse a person who is on his own side of the road for running carelessly or recklessly into one who is on the wrong side. On the other hand a party may have disobeyed the law and yet not be guilty of contributory negligence.

The defendant's counsel claims that notwithstanding the defendant's negligence and the danger therefrom confronting the plaintiff he should instead of turning to the left have kept forward on the right side of Queen Street and that by doing so no damage would have resulted to either car. This no doubt would have been the result. But as against this view the plaintiff's counsel contends that owing to the defendant's negligence in cutting the corner, and with his car bearing down upon the plaintiff, the latter was placed in a perilous position, and not being able to read the defendant's mind and know his intention at the last moment to turn to the right, the judgment he exercised in the emergency even if not infallible should not in the circumstances be too closely scrutinized and that in reading the defendant's negligence was in the circumstances the main or real cause of the accident.

The authorities seem to lean to this view. In Foster vs. Zazity, 24 O.W.N. 127, Master J. said: "The law does not require a supernatural poise or self control on the part of the driver of a motor vehicle, if some unforeseen emergency occurs which would naturally over-

power the judgment of an ordinarily careful driver so that he failed to adopt the best course possible he may not be negligent." A case very similar to this was tried in the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia before Mr. Justice Russell on July 26th, 1916. The case was Bain vs. Fuller, reported in 29 D.L.R. 113. It arose out of a collision between two cars on the corner of Parade and Willow Streets in the town of Yarmouth. Parade Street runs east and west and intersects Willow Street, which runs north and south. The rule of the road was then to go to the left. The plaintiff's car was proceeding west on the left side of Parade Street; the defendant's car was proceeding north on the right side of Willow Street. When they reached the southwest corner of the streets at the same time and both fearing a collision the defendant's car which intended to turn to the eastward on Parade Street attempted to reach the north or left side of this street and the

occurs which would naturally overpower the judgment of an ordinarily careful driver so that he failed to adopt the best course possible he may not be negligent."

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plaintiff at the same time turning his car to the right or northward to evade the defendant's car both cars collided doing considerable damage. Russell J. in his judgment said: "But the defendant claims that the course pursued by the plaintiff's car not only contributed to the result but was the efficient cause of the accident. He is no doubt right in saying that if the plaintiff's car had continued on its course instead of swinging to the northward the accident would not have happened. But it is easy to be wise after the event. If the plaintiff's chauffeur had known that the defendant who came out of Willow Street on the wrong side of the road meant to immediately cross over to the proper side of Parade Street it is certain that he would have held to his original course. But it is equally certain that he had no such knowledge. He saw the defendant's car ahead of him on the wrong side of the road. He had no time for deliberation. He had reason to fear a collision and the instinct of self preservation

tion we may feel well assured prompted him to take the course which at the moment seemed to him the most likely to save his own life and that of his passengers."

Every word of the learned Judge's reasoning applies with peculiar aptness to the facts in this case. There will be judgment for the plaintiff for \$116.25 and costs.
