SAINT JOHN, N.B., March 24 (CP)—The amazing Saint John Beavers did it again.

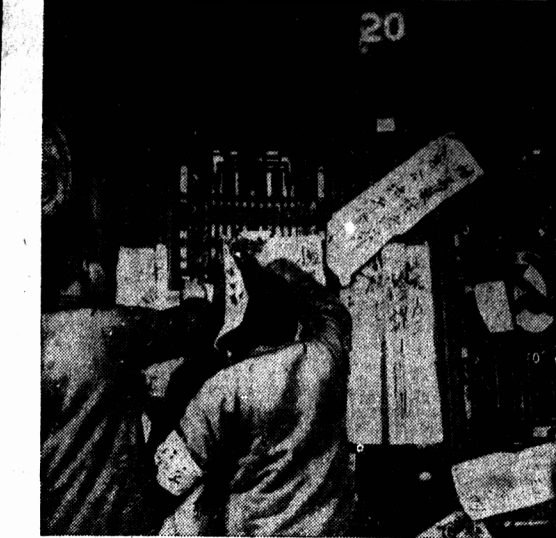
Outclassed 8-1 by Hamilton Tigers last Thursday, the Maritime champions rallied Saturday night to edge Hamilton 6-5 and square the Allain Cup eastern Canada quarter-finals at 1-1. The deciding game will be played here tomorrow night.

In a hard, fast and rough contest, the Tigers still demonstrated brilliant combination work but it was a case of grimly fighting Beavers simply refusing to be beaten.

Their determination recalled the Maritime senior finals when Beavers, apparently hopelessly outclassed by Halifax Navy in the opening struggle fought hard enough to extend the series to its full length and finally win the tri-province crown.

Beavers gained their slim margin of victory last night by outscoring the Ontario boys 3-1 in the first period. Each team shot a brace in both the second and third sessions.

Winger Dillon Brady of Hamilton started and ended the scoring.

He was born in Moscow, studied law at Petrograd (Leningrad) and entered the Foreign Office of Czarist Russia in 1914.

DETROIT, March 24 (AP)—With their famous Kitchener line of Milt Schmidt, Bobby Bauer and Woody Dumart slamming home four goals and assisting on the other, Boston Bruins mastered the Detroit Red Wings 5-2 before 13,317 fans here tonight, taking a 2-1 lead in games in their first-round Stanley Cup hockey playoff series.

The war-veteran Bruin line accounted for four goals and four assists with Schmidt and Dumart each hammering in two counters and assisting once and Bauer contributing two assists.

All five of Boston's goals were recorded before the Red Wings finally beat goalie Frankie Brimsek of the Bruins for their first tally with only seven minutes of playing time remaining.

The teams meet here again Tuesday with the fifth game at Boston next Thursday.
