Highgraders Are Costly To Gold Mines

TORONTO, Sept. 13—(CP)—Highgraders are stealing \$1,000,000 a year in gold from Ontario mines and their apprehension should become the responsibility of the R.C.M.P., Mines Minister Gemmill of Ontario said here today. Mr. Gemmill, just returned from the annual conference of Provincial Mines Ministers at Fredericton, said delegates to the conference unanimously supported a recommendation that highgrading should become a federal offence.

Million-Dollar Job At S'side Airport Near End

A million dollar contract at the R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, is now almost completed. A two-year job of lengthening and re-capping the runways by Curran and Briggs, Ltd. will probably come to an end the latter part of this month. Runways on the station are now long enough to take the largest aircraft now in service. One runway is 6,000 feet in length, one is 5,000 feet and the third is 3,000 feet.

All have been recapped with a layer of asphalt and three concrete buttons, each 200 feet long and the width of the runways, have been constructed to enable jet aircraft to operate here. All of the asphalt work is completed and the laying of cement will be done this week. Only a small amount of grading will then remain to be done.

Curran and Briggs, Ltd. are now working on a new and much smaller contract paving all the streets of the air station with asphalt and laying sidewalks of the same material. The entrance road from the gate to the main highway which is already paved is being recapped. The paving of the streets and sidewalks will be an important improvement to the station, particularly in the spring when they used to become pretty muddy. It is all a part of the building up of the Summerside station to a permanent status and making it an important link in the chain of air stations across Canada.—S.

Will Observe Battle Of Britain Sunday At S'Side

The annual observance of Battle of Britain Sunday commemorates the sacrifice of that small group of airmen who defended Britain in the skies against a German air force superior in numbers in the late summer of 1940. The parade will be held at 10 o'clock on Sunday, Sept. 18th. This is the 9th anniversary of that gallant stand and the R.C.A.F. in Summerside will observe the day by a full parade of station personnel in the afternoon. The ceremonies will include a drum head service in Memorial Park and a march past at which the salute will be taken by His Honor, Lieutenant Governor J.A. Bernard.

The parade consisting of R.C.A.F. personnel and Summerside Air Cadets will form up at the High School and proceed to the park preceded by the band of the 17th Recce Regiment of Charlottetown. At the park wreaths will be laid at the war memorial and the drum head service will be held at three o'clock. The parade will then proceed to Water Street where the saluting base will be located.

In attendance at the reviewing stand will be the Premier of the Province, the Hon. J. Walter Jones, Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, Mayor J.F. Arnett, W.G.D.A. Willis, D.F.C., local Federal and Provincial members and representatives of the army and navy. During the ceremonies there will be an aerial salute of a squadron of nine aircraft.—S.
