Women to Hold Second Anti-War Conference

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—The second conference on the "Cease and Cure of War" will be held early in December when delegates from nine national women's organizations will participate in the discussions.

"We have now, after two years of study, a pretty clear understanding of the causes of war," said Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, chairman of the committee which has been directing the continuation work of the first conference. "We believe all war causes may either be removed entirely or kept under control, and are now certain that it is the business of all governments that call themselves civilized to find the way."

The organizations included are the American Association of University Women, Federation of Women's Clubs, League of Women Voters, Young Women's Christian Association, Council of Jewish Women, Women's Trade Union League, Women's Christian Temperance Union, Council of Women for Home Missions, and Federation of Women's Boards of Foreign Missions of North America.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—The American Legion has announced the beginning of a campaign to prevent the abolition of poison gas in warfare. On the eve of its annual meeting at Philadelphia, Legion headquarters here stated Sunday that it is sending out 25,000 copies of a circular favoring the retention of gas warfare in an attempt to prevent the Senate from ratifying the poison gas protocol adopted at Geneva about a year ago. The Legion regards it as humane and effective in bringing war to a speedy end.

Illinois lays claim to the oldest and youngest performers in major golf tournaments this season.

Lewis W. Fitcher, G.A.R. veteran, won second low net honors in the Illinois Senior tournament a few weeks after his 84th birthday. Sammy Albert, a 15-year old south-paw, won the Western junior championship after a training period which began when he was 11 years of age.
