As all congregations of the Presbytery of P.E.I. are uniting in undertaking the support of Mr. McKenzie it will be necessary for each to report at the meeting of Presbytery on this occasion what has been done to secure the additional contribution and what amount may be expected. The regular meeting of the Hope River social and debating society was held in Hope River hall recently. The Pres. Everett Hogan occupied the chair. It was moved that Clarence Reid open the subject for debate at the next meeting Feb. 8th. The subject for debate on that evening being, Resolved that there would be more happiness in the world if all private property was abolished and all things held in common. It was then moved that the following subject be debated by the junior members of the society on the evening of Feb. 15th. Resolved that the cow wheat, the following are the members to take part: Austin McGuigan, Patrick Murphy, Douglas Hogan, Louis McGuigan. The subject for debate namely Resolved that the study of history is more valuable than any other form of literature was then opened by John McGuigan who read a short paper dealing with the history of ancient times, the middle ages and modern times. He dwelt at some length on tradition, inscriptions, monuments, historical poems etc., and gave extracts from the pens of Cicero, Archbishop O'Brien and others to prove history to be the most valuable. He was followed by M. H. Coughlan who claimed that a study of history was of no practical use as the possession of a number of dry facts concerning characters who lived hundreds of years ago would help a man to earn a dollar, whereas on the other hand a study of science, medicine or engineering would enable a man to earn his livelihood. If he was of an inventive turn of mind he might invent something as a result of those studies which would make his fortune. He also thought there was more benefit to be derived from a study of some of the best thoughts of the great minds of past and present which were to be found in poetry and standard novels compared with the dry facts of history. He was followed by Clarence Reid who thought the study of history was an injury instead of a benefit as no two historians agreed on many points of history this had a tendency to sow in the mind of the unprejudiced reader the seeds of skepticism. He was followed by Everett Hogan who claimed it was the study of the political history of nations that enabled persons to improve the laws and told of cases where governments had to go back to the political histories of nations for precedents. A vote being taken resulted in a large majority in favor of the study of history. A committee has been appointed to get up a mock trial to be held under the auspices of the society in the near future. This society intends visiting Cavendish Literary society to-night Feb. 7th, to take part in a union debate. Subject, Resolved that the editor wields more power than the orator. M. H. Coughlan is to open the debate.

The following Provincialists have registered at the Canadian High Commissioner's office in London, Eng., J. H. Fraser, Georgetown, J. C. Peacock, Bedouque.

In answer to Mr. Martin (Queen's), in the House of Commons at Ottawa, a few days ago, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that the government is appointing a delegate with power to discuss with accredited representatives of the various local governments affected the question of the relative rights and jurisdiction with respect to the fisheries. The government is unaware of any difficulties which should prevent an amicable settlement of rights. The government is not aware that the divided jurisdiction between federal government and the governments of the provinces has proved detrimental to the interests of the fisheries, but the government appreciates that these interests could proceed on a better and more satisfactory basis with undivided jurisdiction.

The time fixed for the receiving of nominations for candidates for election as members of the Intercolonial and Prince Edward Island Railways Employees' Provident Fund Board, expired at noon on the 1st instant, and the nomination papers which have been received, were submitted to the Board, at a meeting which was held at Moncton on the 3rd instant. The nominations received were three in number, as follows:—

Jas. W. Nairn, Engineman, Truro, St. John.
 Frederick Tapley, Freight Agent, St. John.
 Wm. M. Thompson, Conductor, Moncton.

A telegram which was received from Mr. Tapley, to the effect that there were only three nominations received, that he, in order to save the expense which would be incurred if an election was held, desired to withdraw his nomination for this year, was read. After considering the matter, and the reasons which prompted Mr. Tapley to send his withdrawal, it was decided to accept the same and thus obviate the necessity of having an election. Mr. Tapley's action in withdrawing for the reasons given was very much appreciated.

The Allan line steamship Sardinian, Captain Henry, which arrived at St. John, N.B., a few days ago, had on board the crew of the Prince Edward Island brigantine Aquilla, who were taken off the ship in mid-Atlantic early in December after the Aquilla had been reduced to a derelict by a succession of gales. Huddled on the poop of their waterlogged ship for five days with no fire and nothing to eat but sea food biscuit, and momentarily expecting the hull to go to the bottom, they had an experience which none of them ever want to face again. The same storm drove the Mount Temple to her fate on Ironbound Island, and the mid-Atlantic which was taking a cargo of laths from Richibucto to New York, off Cape Cod. By the end of three days she was reduced to a helpless derelict. Sails, rigging, deckload, bulwarks and cathead had all been washed overboard by the tremendous seas and with no shelter, and but scanty provisions, the crew were forced to take refuge on the poop. Finally, on December 8th, when 300 miles off Sandy Hook, the Anchor liner Italia hove in sight and seeing their signals, launched a boat. The sea had somewhat subsided by this time, but it was still running furiously, and it was several hours before the men were taken off. The Aquilla was then set on fire and after two hours more hard work, the Italia was reached. They were treated most hospitably on the Anchor liner, and on landing at Genoa they were sent to London by the British Consul and joined the Sardinian, where Captain Henry, a fellow countryman treated them most hospitably. The crew consisted of Captain Basil Kelly, Summerside; E. Peacock, mate, Bedouque; A. Gallant, Summerside; second mate, H. Fraser, Georgetown; steward, T. Miller, Valparaiso; and F. Clements, Nova Scotia, seaman.
