## TIMELY NOTES ON TOPICS CONNECTED WITH Silver Fox and Mink Farming

According to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics fox pelts available from Canadian Fur Farms for 1945 will be 36% less than the 1944-45 season, but mink pelts will be up about 6%. The number of foxes and mink which will be pelted on fur farms for the 1945-46 marketing season are as follows: 60,900 standard silver; 46,800 new type fox; 388,100 standard mink and 129,600 mutation mink. This estimate is based on reports received from a sample of 307 fox and 747 mink farms.

Prince Edward Island exhibitors at the Amherst Fox Show include George A. Callbeck, Summerside, and Ernest T. Mill, Mills Point, and possibly others. Judging will be done by Douglas Bell of Carleton, provincial fur grader for the Dominion Department of Agriculture. After the show Mr. Callbeck leaves for western Canada. He will stop off at Winnipeg, Saskatoon and Edmonton and will judge one or more of the western shows. There will be no live fox or mink show in Ontario this year. The breeders were circularized and came to that conclusion. Some of the Ontario breeders will exhibit at the International Fox and Mink Show to be held at Detroit, Michigan, notably Ruthven Fur Farms and probably Gilroy Bros.

We have received from the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association, Summerside, a report of the Fur Marketing Department which is presided over by George A. Callbeck, who represented it at the Montreal sale recently, and it is as follows: —

Current reports from the various component parts of the fur trade indicate that the industry continues in an unsatisfactory condition. Many factors are mentioned as contributing causes, such as excise taxes; high manufacturing costs, etc. resulting in high retail prices and lack of consumer interest. This condition applies not only to fox and mink, but practically all types of fur. Some quarters predict an early improvement in conditions generally, however, we see no indication of any immediate improvement, particularly from the standpoint of the fox and mink rancher. Further market restrictions are indicated in a recent cable from London to the effect that after Oct. 31st furs consigned to London Auctions from hard currency countries must be sold for export only to hard currency countries or to local traders presenting hard quota certificates.

Sales of raw fox pelts have continued slow, with prices continuing on the present low basis. Mink are also showing a tendency to price resistance. As yet, we see no substantial indication of price advances for these articles.

The Canadian Fur Auction Sales Co. (Quebec) Ltd. held a Special Sale of Silver and Mutation Fox pelts October 27th to October 28th, inclusive, which 1412 pelts were catalogued. 50% of the offering was sold. The following summarizes the selling of the fox catalogue:

**3rd Charlottetown Troop**

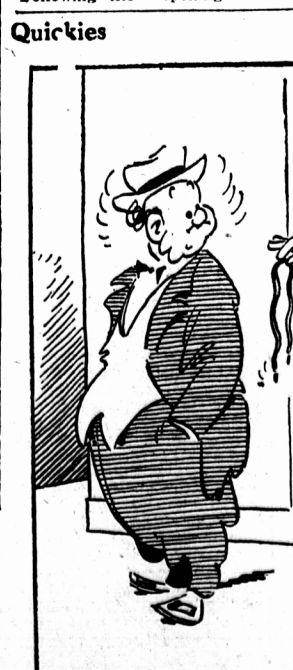

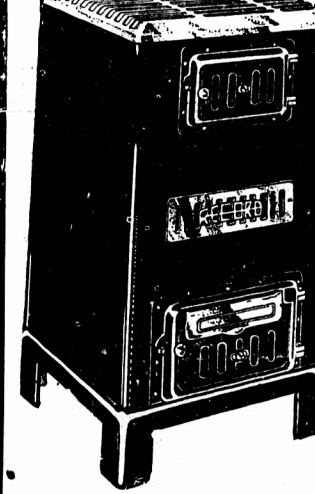

### Savings Bond Sales Brighter In Maritimes

HALIFAX, Nov. 4. — (CP) — As the sale of the third series, Canada Savings Bonds, is drawing to a close this week the Maritime Provinces are regarded as almost certain to better their showing of last year while the Province of Quebec is currently running in last place on a percentage basis, according to a report released today by the Bank of Canada.

Nova Scotia's final figures are expected to exceed those of last year, both in the number of applications and dollar volume of purchases.

Total payroll savings purchases of Canada Savings Bonds from the various Dominion regions to date show a total of \$90,574,350. It was regarded as almost certain that total payroll sales will exceed last year's mark of \$109,000,000, and might even equal the first series mark of \$114,000,000.

Reports compiled across Canada showed 433,482 applications averaging \$208.95, have been received on the payroll savings plan to date, compared to 380,124 applications averaging \$202.19 for series two.

Nearly all Provinces and special groups have recorded payroll sales equalling 80 per cent or better of their 1947 totals. Ontario and the Prairies lead the parade with marks of 101 per cent and 97 per cent, respectively. Regional directors in these two areas estimate

that their final figures will be at least 10 per cent over last year.
