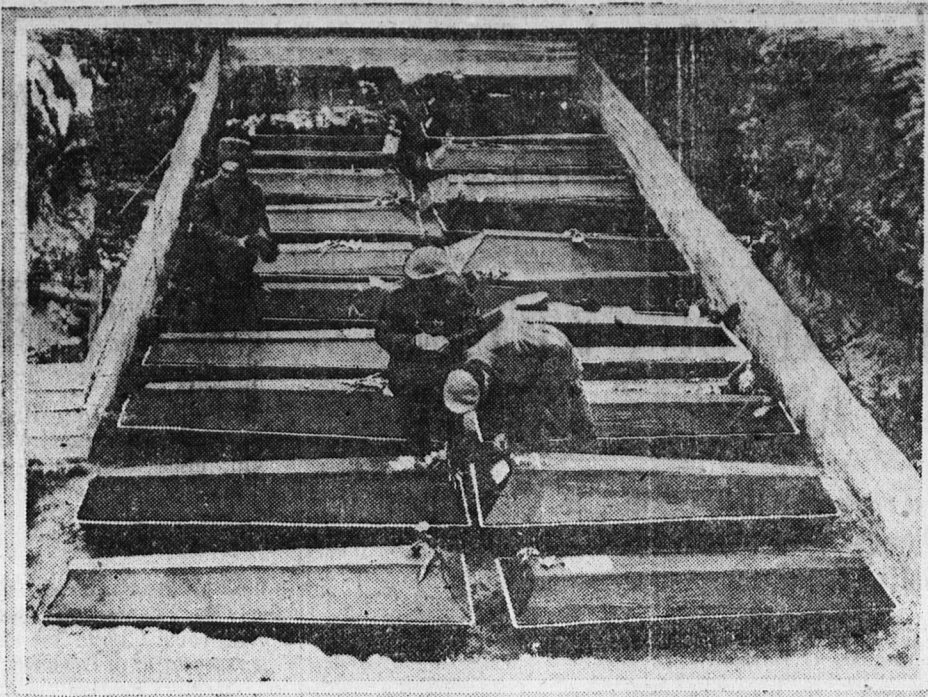

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age who has secured a certificate of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not at Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Title—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after entering homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

There were four graves like this one. Each grave contained forty-five caskets.

ATTITUDE OF LABOR MEN IS CHANGED TOO

Labor Leaders Likely to Issue Conspicuous Statement.

OTTAWA.—An official statement outlining the position of organized labor on the question of conscription will be issued by the chief officers of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress. A decision to this effect was arrived at last night, after a conference of an hour's duration between Sir Robert Borden, Premier, and J. Watters, president of the Congress, and P. M. Draper, secretary. It is believed the Labor men have changed considerably the view previously expressed by one of their number about being unalterably opposed to conscription.

Wouldn't Say Much

The representatives of the labor men met Sir Robert Borden last night to ascertain whether the Premier's visit to England and France had brought to light developments of a nature such as to change their position of uncompromising opposition to the proposal. No indication as to the probable outcome of the conference was obtainable last night, all three members of the deputation declining to commit themselves before a conference, which will be held this morning.

A Food Controller

In addition to the question of conscription, other important matters were brought to the attention of the Premier, of which the principal was that with reference to the appointment of a food controller, which was urged by presentation of several resolutions setting forth that some such action was imperative. In reply to these representations, Sir Robert stated to the officers of the Congress that the problem would be thoroughly gone into and settled by the members of the Cabinet.

It was also urged upon the Premier that organized labor was entitled to greater measure of recognition in connection with matters pertaining to the prosecution of the war, and while no definite statement in this regard was obtainable, it is understood that direct representation in the cabinet was more than hinted at by the delegates.

Other Things Discussed

The dissatisfaction which has several times been expressed regarding the attitude of the Imperial Munitions Board towards organized labor was voiced, in reply to which the Premier requested that a memorandum on the subject be prepared and submitted to him. The other question taken up was that with reference to the deposit of \$200 required of candidates in federal elections, which qualifications the officers of the Congress wish to have abolished. Consideration was promised.

MONTREAL PASTOR

The Rev. George S. Duncan, minister of St. Andrew's Church of Scotland, Montreal, and a nephew of Mr. F. W. Hymnman of this said, said in the course of his sermon last Sunday:

"Long have we waited for a man to rise, unafraid of his political popularity, a man who in measured words, but in no measured loyalty to the universal cause of humanity, rightness and justice, and peace should be strong enough, brave enough, British enough, Christian enough, man enough to declare that Canada shall not be behind the nations in the great struggle for the freedom of mankind and the sacredness of human life; man enough to urge onwards and slackers and shirkers and deserters to do their duty as citizens and men, even at this late hour; man enough to challenge, as Sir Robert Borden has just challenged, those who profess in carefully selected phrases their loyalty to the Empire, and their non-committal interest in this war of wars.

"Cos' what it may, let us know where we are," he continued. "Let us know if the sacrifices already made by the finest and noblest of Canada's sons and the British race are to be thrown away as useless and a mistake. It is time for the stern hand; it is time for vigorous dealing with disloyal intriguers, editorial or otherwise."

"Some families had done sufficient in the way of sacrifice," he said, "others had done too much, and other thousands were hiding behind political and other leaders, thousands of men who could fill up the gaps at the front. The crisis had come, and a man had been found strong enough to tell Canada its duty and if he failed the blame and shame would not be his, but that of those who might try to embarrass him and make political capital out of the world's agony."

"We want to end this awful war as speedily as possible, for after this great foe to mankind is beaten we shall see more clearly the essential brotherhood of men as greater than all national limitations," he concluded.
