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PARLIAMENT WILL REOPEN AT OTTAWA TODAY

Budget will be Brought Down Early in Month, U. S. Tariff Innovations may Result in Deferring Revision of Canadian Tariff.

OTTAWA, March 28.—The Legislature will gather again at the capital tomorrow following a brief Easter recess during which absolute quiet prevailed on the hill. The return of parliamentarians coincides with the close of the fiscal year and it will be incumbent upon the government to secure some supply for the carrying on of administration. So far no lump sum has been asked for and it is quite doubtful if the opposition will approve of any such appropriation without considerable protest. Sir Henry Drayton's second budget task of providing during the coming year a sum of money in excess of the total revenue reached during the current year, is a big job. The magnitude of the amount coupled with uncertain conditions on the matter of tariff on the other side of the border will, it is believed, furnish Sir Henry with an excuse to defer the promised tariff revision for another session. Little revision of an important nature is expected in the coming budget.

Earthquake Recorded At Halifax, N. S.

quake took place within a compara-

AVIATOR'S SPEECH RESTORED

BOSTON, March 28.—Adminis-
tration of ether to Ernest Young,
former British aviator, under deten-
tion here pending an investiga-
tion as to his citizenship, brought
back his lost power of speech.
After being shot down behind the
German lines Young became speech-
less. He subsequently recovered the
use of his tongue while in a prison
camp. His tumble from his bed
here recently and physicians found
that again he could not talk. Dr.
Albert Murphy attached to the
medical staff at a Long Island
institution, conceived the idea of
ether treatment after he had learn-
ed some of Young's history. Young
began to talk as soon as he came
out of the ether.

\$2,000,000 COMPANY TO SUPPLY LIGHT, HEAT AND POWER ALL OVER P. E. ISLAND

This is the Position Which a Company, Headed by Eminent Financiers and Elec- tricians are said to Have in View for this Province and for Which a Measure is About to be Introduced in the Legisla- ture.

The Prince Edward Island Light
Heat and Power Company, Limited
is the name of a company seeking
incorporation at the present ses-
ion of the Provincial Legislature.
The company's object is one
which if carried into effect will be
of tremendous importance to the
Province. It is stated in seeking
a charter to empower it to supply
light, heat and power by elec-
tricity to all parts of the province
including Charlottetown,
Summerside and all the towns and
villages, which means that not on-
ly the residents of industrial
centres, but also farmers as well,
will be able to obtain electric light-
ing, heat and power for a wide
range of purposes.

The magnitude of the enterprise
may be judged from the fact that
the capital stock is \$2,000,000.
This amount will be increas-
ed as the business expands. The
incorporators include Mr.
Henry A. Sanders of London, Eng-
land, capitalist and electrical engi-
ner, Mr. Noah A. Timmons of
Montreal, capitalist, Mr. John A.
Bennan of Chicago, Electrical En-
gineer, Mr. William J. O'Leary
of Montreal, Electrical Engineer
and Mr. J. J. Hughes, Ex-M.P. of
Charlottetown and Souris.

There will also be associated
with these gentlemen, two other
well known business men of this
province. The company is planning
the construction of their plant at some
central point from which lines will
radiate, gradually covering the
whole island. When the system
is fully installed and the lines com-
pleted, the company will require
a permanent staff of upwards of
two hundred men and while con-
struction is going on, a large num-
ber will be employed.

One of the great barriers in the
way of practical advancement in
this province has been the lack of
electric power at a reasonable price.
This company proposes to supply
power in such quantities, and at
such attractive rates, that it is ex-
pected that small factories will
spring up all over the island thus
fulfilling a long desired hope.

On many of the farms in Ontario
where electric power has been
widely distributed the farmer no
only lights his dwellings, barns
and outbuildings by electricity, but
by the same agency separates his
cream, pumps his water, churns
his butter, shears his sheep,
saws his wood, threshes his grain,
cuts his feed, sharpens his farm
implements and performs other
essential operations.

Electricity takes away much of
the drudgery from the housewife
whether in country or town.

It is the willing, capable and
dependable servant that never
grows weary in well doing. It
sharpens the knives, washes the
dishes, sweeps the floors, wash
es and irons the clothes, cooks the
food, turns the sewing machine,
operates the gramophone and per-
forms many other tasks. What is
true of Ontario can also become
true of Prince Edward Island for
all that is necessary is to utilize the
wonderful strength of electric power
and the work is done.

Turkey will Tax Bachelors Heavily

lation of Turkey the Turkish Na-
tionalist Parliament at Ankara is
considering a bill to compel all
men aged 25 or more to marry. Un-
less prevented by health reasons
bachelors over that age will be
very heavily taxed while married
men will enjoy privileges in taxa-
tion and military service.

No prospect of Drought in Britain

LONDON, March 28.—Alarm
over the prospect of Great Britain
going dry was deprecated by Baron
Birkenhead, Lord Chancellor, while
speaking at the annual banquet of
the Allied Brewery Trades Associa-
tion. He declared that members of
the Association did not in his belief
have any cause for anxiety as to
the apprehension or chance of a
general drought such as has taken
place in America. He said: "I am
one of those who do not believe
that it is even conceivable that a
similar change can take place in
Great Britain."

Sinn Fein Office Is Raided

DUBLIN, Mar. 28.—The head-
quarters of Sinn Fein propaganda
department 11, Moleworth St.,
was raided last night by the police
authorities auxiliaries who effected
what is officially described as the
largest capture of seditious litera-
ture yet made in Ireland. Several
tons and files of books and other
documentary matter were seized in
the raid. The office equipment at
headquarters is most elaborate.
The department had numbers of
divisions, one of which dealt with
propaganda in foreign countries,
including Italy, France and Spain,
according to official reports of raid.
Files of letters addressed to Sinn
Fein agents and others in those
countries were seized. All the
leading British newspapers were
on file at the department and
scores of volumes of clippings and
circular letters addressed to mem-
bers of the House of Commons
were seized. Among the docu-
ments taken it is announced was
the latest decree of the "Irish Re-
publican Parliament" proclaiming
a boycott upon British agricultural
machinery. The Irish bulletin was
issued from this office but its re-
appearance elsewhere is expected
as none of the members of the
staff were found on the premises.

Merchant Marine Shows Profit

OTTAWA, March 28.—A knock-
out for the pessimists who have
been confidently predicting an
operating deficit for the govern-
ment Merchant Marine, is the
official verdict of the Department
of Marine. Speculation has placed
the Merchant Marine trial balance
in the same light as that of the
National Railways.

Possibility of a Marine Disaster

NEW YORK, March 28.—An un-
known vessel, in distress of which
no trace could be found after a sev-
eral hour search, was reported
here by radio from the steamship
West Chafala enroute from Bre-
men to Baltimore.

According to the radio message,
early Friday morning, three rock-
ets fired at short intervals were
observed from the bridge of the
West Chafala when it was approxi-
mately 290 miles southeast of Hal-
fax. The steamer put about and
for a number of hours made a care-
ful search of the ocean for the
origin of the signal but without
result. Word of observing the
rockets was flashed by wireless to
other ships in that vicinity.

Islander's Death In Springfield, Mass.

The Springfield, Mass., Urton of
the 21st, last, says:
Donald W. McPhee, aged 88, a
Civil war veteran and resident of
this city for 55 years died at 8:30
o'clock this morning at his home,
73 Ventura Street of heart trouble.
He had been for a long time in
business as a house painter until
he retired six years ago. He had
been in feeble health the past
winter.

Mr. McPhee was born in Card-
igan Bridge, Prince Edward Island.
He learned the shoemaker's trade
and came to Boston just before the
outbreak of the Civil War. He en-
listed in the 20th Mass. Vols. and
served through the earlier part of
the war in Virginia. He was wound-
ed at the first battle of Fredericks-
burg, where he lost an arm. He re-
mained, suffered heavily in that
engagement.

After returning to Boston Mr. Mc-
Phee served as a guard at the
Charleston Navy Yard and after
coming to this city was employed
as a guard at the United States
Army until he went into the
house painting business.

He leaves five sons, Joseph J. of
Colorado, Emmanuel A., Rodolph
P., James F. and Donald A., and a
daughter, Miss Mattie G. McPhee,
all of this city. He also leaves seven
grandchildren.

Murdered Negroes Still Being Found

MONTICELLO, GA., Mar. 28.—
Two more bodies of negroes were
recovered from the Alcomey River
here today making a total of eleven
bodies found since the authori-
ties began investigating the charges
of peonage and murder against
John Williams a Jasper County
farmer. Like the first three found
a number of days ago the bodies
recovered today were chained to-
gether and weighed down with
sacks of stones and iron. Five
bodies were found on Saturday
buried in the Williams plantation.
According to a confession made to
Department of Justice agents by
Clyde Manning, a negro employed
by Williams, eleven negroes were
slain and their bodies made away
with in order to prevent them test-
ifying against Williams in peonage
charges. Manning, it was
said, confessed he killed five of
them with axe at Williams order.
The bodies were recovered Satur-
day after he pointed out the place
of burial.

Prince of Wales Will open Ulster Parliament
