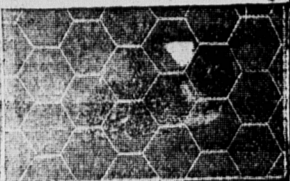

Britain Will Ensure Use Of Home Wheat By Mills

LONDON, Aug. 29.—Some disclosure of the hand the British government will play at the Imperial conference was made by Dr. Addison, minister of agriculture, in a speech of Saturday. He made the authoritative announcement for the first time that the government's policy to help British wheat growers is to ensure use of the minimum quota of home grown wheat by the milling trade. He gave further details about the constructive scheme but said, "As soon as the conclusions of the Imperial conference are known, the government will undertake what-ever practicable steps can be devised to put cereal growing in this country on an economic foundation."

Proposals to be discussed with the Dominions are concerned with import boards and bulk purchasing. The Dominions will be asked if satisfactory arrangements can be made regarding prices and if they will give reciprocal favors in return for a guaranteed slice of the British market. Dr. Addison did not express any confidence that an agreement will be reached at the Imperial conference and it is remembered that Phillip Snowden has spoken very doubtfully. A policy of a quota for British wheat will be adopted whatever the results of the conference, but it will require the regulation of imported flour.

Dr. Addison said the free trade system as applied 50 years ago is as dead as Queen Anne. He does not believe in import duties but he is prepared to keep out certain imports altogether. If an agreement is made with the Dominions, the quota principle will probably be applied to Empire wheat as well as home grown.

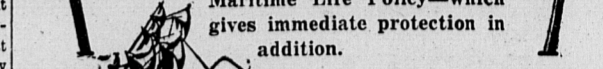
