R. T. Holman Wins Provincial Golf Title

Robert T. Holman of Charlottetown won the provincial golf title in Summerside Saturday. He scored a total of 183 for the 36-hole tournament, which was held at the Charlottetown Club. Richard Bagshaw and C. Ray Moore, each with a score of 184, were runners-up.

The first section of the competition was played at Charlottetown on Wednesday. Holman took the lead in the opening 18 holes, scoring 78 to Holman's 82 and Moore's 83, but he slipped back in Summerside, scoring 105 to Holman's 86. Moore, tied with Bagshaw for second place, chalked up an 87 in the second half of the competition.

The leaders played as a threesome in the second round. W. E. Cotton of Charlottetown with 184 led the second division while Ralph Jenkins, also of Charlottetown had the best net score, making 142.

Frank Acorn, also of Charlottetown led the third division with 187. Arnett Howatt, another Charlottetown golfer with 140 had the best net score.

P. O. George Millard of the Royal Air Force was last year's provincial champion while Kelly was the runner-up.

Patrick said "the believes" the Kingston City Council had approved the proposal and that the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association is in favor.

"Details and plans will be forthcoming at a later date," he said.

Lamezia. At last reports they held a line from a point immediately north of Lamezia on the west coast of Sicily to the east coast of Calabria.

Abundant evidence indicated the Germans had abandoned hope of holding any ground in extreme southern Italy, and were rushing troops in that sector northward and westward to the all-important battle of the Salerno-Naples area.

Nazis Retreat to North

Allied airmen reported heavy troop and vehicle movements from Corleto, coming presumably from the Tarento area where the Nazis had armored units, and northward from other points.

(The Morocco Radio said the 8th Army was chalking up daily gains of 24 miles.)

Mines and demolitions were the only real hindrance to the advance.

Lt.-Gen Mark W. Clark's 8th Army of British and United States troops drove deeper inland in the Salerno area despite fierce German opposition headquarters declared, and cautious officers indicated the greatest crisis of this daring landing was past, with beachheads firmly established.

Reinforcements are coming ashore "ahead of schedule," headquarters said.

British units also were fanning out north and northeast of Tarento, meeting elements of the German 1st parachute division.

Evidently staking everything on preventing expansion of the 5th Army zone in the Naples-Salerno region, the Germans threw in large forces of bombers and fighters.

Italian sabotage, unrest and passive opposition doubtless tied up a large portion of Hitler's army in Italy that otherwise could be thrown against the Allies near Naples.

Census Shows More Persons Employed

OTTAWA, Sept. 12 (CP)—The Dom. Bureau of Statistics said today that in the period from 1931 to 1941 the gainfully occupied male population of Canada increased by 352,176 or 10.8 per cent, and the female population in the same category by 168,896 or 25.4 per cent.

Preliminary figures indicated that the number of persons in Canada gainfully occupied at the 1941 census was 4,448,302, of whom 3,615,547 were males and 832,755 were females.

The gainfully occupied population was distributed by province as follows: Prince Edward Island, 28,560 males, 5,138 females. Nova Scotia, 172,788, 37,378; New Brunswick, 122,352, 27,562; Quebec, 666,559, 260,542; Ontario, 1,234,430, 315,742; Manitoba, 235,061, 46,935; Saskatchewan, 291,031, 42,800; Alberta, 267,732, 40,433; British Columbia, 282,525, 55,223.
