FINAL SESSION OF CONVENTION HELD THURSDAY

Mr. C. F. Hine, Charlottetown Elect-ed President—Teachers Endorse Proposed School System Changes.

Members of the Teachers Federation "unanimously endorsed the principle of the larger administrative units for Prince Edward Island" in a resolution passed at the closing session of the three-day convention, Thursday. The resolution provided for the appointment of a committee to prepare material from which the Adult Education Committee may issue a pamphlet for distribution to study clubs and Women's Institutes.

The Department of Education will be asked to accept the services of a committee chosen from the teachers to make a thorough study of the question of curriculum and as a result propose such changes as would be considered necessary.

The resolutions were following up suggestions discussed at the opening session of the convention when committees appointed by the executive, proposed extensive changes in the public school system in Federation circles during the coming year.

Mr. C. F. Hine, member of the West Kent School staff, Charlottetown, was elected president of the organization. Mr. Edward Hynes, Montague, was made vice-president and Miss Madeline Clarkin, Charlottetown, secretary.

Mr. John C. Matthews, O'Leary, was re-elected recording secretary. Retiring President John M. Gillis, B.A., Tarnish, presided at convention sessions.

President-elect Hine was conducted to the platform by Mr. E. J. H. Morrissey, Charlottetown, chairman of the nominating committee, and Mr. C. B. Jelly, Summerside. In a short address Mr. Hine forecast increased activities in Federation circles during the coming year.

In the resolutions passed were included expressions of loyalty to the new sovereign, King George VI and his Royal Consort, Queen Elizabeth; sincere gratitude to the Charlottetown School Board for the use of Queen Square School hall; and the thanks of the Federation to all who took part to make the convention a success.

Included in the resolutions was a sincere expression of sympathy to Prof. Howard Clark of Prince of Wales College staff on the death of his mother which took place while he was attending convention sessions.

Resolutions were presented by Mr. Elmer Roberts, chairman of the resolutions committee. Teachers in a resolution asked a change in the date of matriculation examinations from July as at present to the last week in June.

A plan to establish a Canadian Council for educational research was also endorsed by Federation members. A letter explaining the plan was read by President Gillis.

Federation membership numbered 416 during the past year. Lieut. Col. L. T. Lowther, chairman of the finance committee, said reporting for his committee.

The finances were in a satisfactory condition. Col. Lowther said, although the surplus in the bank was slightly less than last year. He suggested fewer executive meetings in order to reduce expenses.

Y's Men Hear Interesting Address

Except that Communism did not believe in the existence of any God it resembled strongly the most extreme of the fundamental religions. Its creed was Marx as interpreted by Lenin. The writings of Marx and Lenin were to the Communists what the Bible was to Christians. Like the Christian religion it had a great personal founder, who if he was not worshipped was greatly venerated, which was akin to worship. Communism had its trinity, Marx, Lenin and the five year plan.

In conclusion the speaker said that many were coming to call the quest for the satisfaction of human needs which Communists claim for their work, a religion. Mr. William McLeod was chairman. At a business session the club agreed to a change in the by-laws governing the election of officers.
