Annual Meeting New London Church

The annual meeting of New London Parish was held in St. Stephen's Church, Burlington, on Monday evening, January 23rd.

The following officers were elected for the parish for 1950: Parish Warden—Athol Cotton and Henry Meek; Parish Vestry—Ernest Mill, John Moose, Harry Sudsbury, Eddy Murphy, Arch. Pidgeon, Ivan Duggan, Arnold Meek and William Blakeney; Parish Clerk—William J. Profit; Parish Treasurer—William R. Thompson.

It was decided that the parish which has always been listed as "mission" should become self-supporting, and pay a worthy missionary objective. Missionary objectives were set for each church. The work of the parish will continue to pay its missionary apportionment, but no grant will be received. This decision affords great satisfaction to many of the parishioners, who have long felt that the change should be made.

The financial report showed that the parish had spent more than \$2100 on Capital expenditure in 1949. A resolution was passed to the effect that the parish annual meeting be discontinued for two years, as it was felt that the work could be done as well at the congregational meetings. Congregational annual meetings have been held in each of the churches and the following officers elected: St. Mark's; Warden—Ernest Mill and John Moose; Vestry Clerk—Mrs. J. C. Townsend; Treasurer—William Thompson.

St. Stephen's; Warden—Harry Sudsbury and Eddy Murphy, Jr.; Vestry Clerk—William J. Profit; Treasurer—Ivan Harrington.

St. Thomas'; Warden—Ivan Duggan and Arch Pidgeon; Vestry clerk—Wally Cole; Treasurer—Joe Harding.

Year's Improvements

A summary of the year's activities shows a forward movement at all points. St. Thomas' Church, New London marked its 120th anniversary with appropriate services. Previously, the people there had completely renovated the interior of the church. The Girl's Auxiliary with the aid of a few friends, purchased a new carpet for the chancel and the sanctuary, and new linoleum for the aisle. The exterior of the church was painted. St. Thomas' A. Y. P. A. bought 12 new hymn books, paid for a new Sign Board, and painted the posts around the cemetery. Late in the year, a fine start was made by the men on a new horse shed. St. Stephen's, Burlington, completely renovated the church building. Much of the work was done by the parishioners. The interior was made beautiful by the skill and artistry of Mr. K. Bremmer. The exterior was painted. Two new windows in the sanctuary given by the family in memory of the late William J. Paynter, enhance the beauty of the east end of the church.

A new sign board was also purchased for the church. All this, in addition to the new East Window and the furnace, both installed in 1948, have made the church at Burlington, both comfortable and beautiful.

St. Mark's at Kensington have installed a new and larger furnace. A sign board, indicating the name of the church, and the hours of service was purchased. New green hangings for use in the Trinity season add much to the beauty of the church. The A. Y. P. A. paid for the painting of the walls of the hall. St. Mark's also bought a share in the new Sound Film Projector, recently purchased by a number of organizations in the town of Kensington. The missionary apportionment had been paid by a considerable margin. The rectory barn has been painted and a number of improvements made on the rectory.

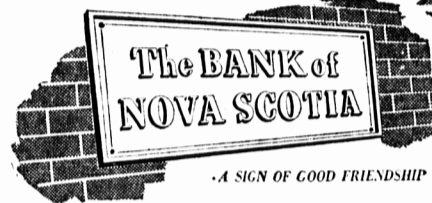
