Military Prisoners Riot, Set Fire To Barracks

(By The Associated Press) INDIANAPOLIS, June 1—(AP)—An army guard was shot and killed, three military prisoners were wounded and six other persons were hurt when several hundred rioting prisoners set fire to disciplinary barracks at Fort Benjamin Harrison, 12 miles north of here, last night. Nine barracks buildings were destroyed by the fire with a loss estimated at \$100,000. An Indianapolis fireman died of a heart attack while fighting the blaze. Maj.-Gen. James L. Collins, commanding officer of the 5th Service Command, Fort Hayes, Columbus, Ohio, who was at Fort Harrison on an inspection trip at the time of the riot, said indications were the riot "was a planned

affair." He said "prompt and efficient action alone prevented a mass break." Approximately 1,900 of the post's 2,777 United States Army prisoners were housed in the section in which the rioting occurred. Preliminary checks indicated none of the prisoners escaped. Gen. Collins in a report to the War Department said the immediate cause of the riot was believed to be extra duty given the prisoners yesterday for infraction of prison rules. All of the rioting prisoners were American soldiers who had been court-martialed, some overseas. Many of them were considered dangerous and some of them had been convicted for arson, rape and murder.

He peered into the Unknown

Galileo (1564-1642) invented an improved telescope, carried on research in magnetism and gravitation, discovered the principle of the pendulum. Contrary to previous teaching, he maintained that bodies of different weights fall with the same velocity. When challenged to prove this theory, he dropped a ten-pound shot and a one-pound shot from the top of the Leaning Tower of Pisa. To the amazement of the University students and faculty gathered to see the experiment, both weights reached the ground at the same time.

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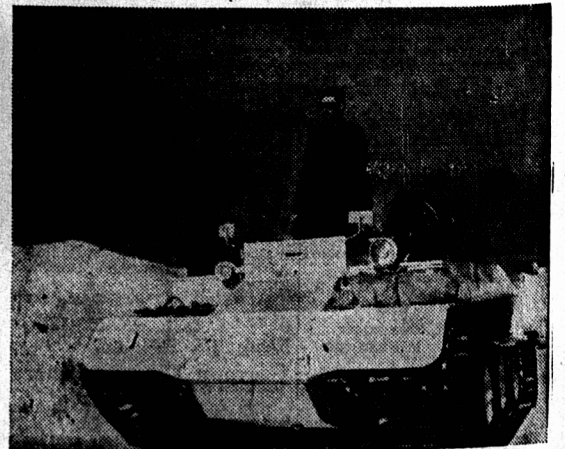
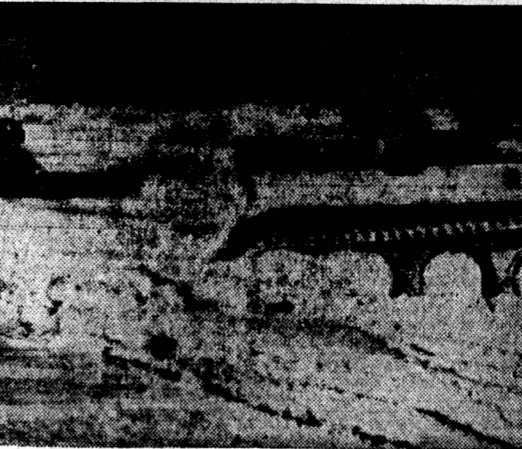
