GERMANY HAS 50 SUBMARINES.

COPENHAGEN, via London, Aug. 25.—The German undersea fleet at present comprises 58 submarines, according to a neutral authority who has just returned to Denmark from Germany. Germany's Baltic fleet, according to the same authority, consists of 38 warships.

Six thousand marines from Kiel have been sent to the eastern fighting front to reinforce the pioneer service of the army, it is stated.

The details of the plan are said to have been worked out by Alvo von Alvensleben, a German broker of Vancouver, who was in Berlin when the war was declared.

LIVE STOCK AND FLOWER SHOW AT ALBERTON

The Live Stock and Flower Show which was held in Alberton yesterday was a success in every respect. The day was all that could be desired and the attendance was very large. Thirty-two left Charlottetown on the special train and there were 84 on board when she pulled out of Summerside.

The formal opening took place at 1.30 p. m. The Chairman of the Committee, Mr. John Agnew, presided and spoke of the good work that had been done by the committee in charge and was much pleased to see the way the people had responded.

Professor Theodore Ross spoke of the value of exhibitions and said the judges would be prepared to answer any questions regarding their decisions and invited the freest discussion both on the part of exhibitors and onlookers.

Prof. W. J. Reid congratulated the people on the number and quality of their exhibits and hoped their show would continue to improve till the stock would be second to none in the province.

Prof. W. R. Reek spoke of the good done by small shows and advised the people to ask plenty of questions and see that the judges made clear the reasons for their awards.

In beef cattle, B. I. Raynor, of Alberton had out a herd of Polled Angus cattle, four females and a bull, all good individuals and in fair condition. R. B. Rankin, of Alberton, had out three good Shorthorn females. The year old heifer and calf were worthy of special mention. Henry Guard, of Mill River, had out a particularly nice Shorthorn bull calf and Mr. Horne, of Elmsdale, showed a fine Polled Angus bull.

In dairy cattle, the Holsteins were well represented, four aged bulls and six cows coming into the ring. The principal exhibitors were Mr. J. Matthews, of Alberton, who showed a bull and five females, and Mr. Charles Pridham, of Montrose. Ayrshires were not as well represented, but Mr. Cahill showed a deep-bodied, low-set, strong pure-bred bull.

TEUTONS MAY MAKE TURKEY SCAPEGOAT.

ROME, Aug. 25.—The opinion prevails here that Germany is planning to make Turkey the scapegoat of the present European conflagration, as otherwise she would not have pushed her ally to such extremes as to render a declaration of war from Italy inevitable, a declaration which means at least half-a-million fresh troops and another powerful fleet sent against the Ottomans, besides the native troops from Thrythra and Italian Somaliland, which have repeatedly asked to be allowed to join Italy in the war against Austria, while during the Libyan campaign they proved themselves loyal even against an enemy of their own creed.

Others believe that the German idea in making an Italo-Turkish war inevitable was to distract Italy from the operations on the Austrian frontier and to induce her to engage large contingents against Turkey, so that at the opportune moment Germany might fall upon Italy with an overwhelming army, repeating in Lombardy and Venetia what has already occurred in France, Belgium and Poland.

In this case military experts here think that Germany is wrong, as Italy will always have on the Alpine-isonzo front more troops than are necessary to check any attempt of invasion. Besides, as the nature of the land prevented Austria from entering Serbia, for the same reason it would be almost impossible to dislodge the Italians from the positions they have occupied on the Austrian front.

Since the days when the Turkish 'brats' harried the Italian coasts and the great battle of Lepanto was fought, hatred and distrust of Turkey have been bred in Italians, while Turkey's machinations against Italy and the Italians throughout the Near East, Libya and Cyrenaica, and her contempt for the remonstrances of the Italian Government, have aroused bitter feelings.
