EDUCATIONAL CHANGES.

Yesterday after nearly forty years of arduous, most efficient and successful college work Dr. Anderson handed over to his successor the Principalship of Prince of Wales College. Though he is not retiring from duty, but entering upon another department as Superintendent of Education, affording an ample field for his fine talents and great energy, still the change marks an epoch in our educational history and especially in the history of Prince of Wales College. No other man ever performed so great a work in developing the minds of the young people of Prince Edward Island as Dr. Anderson has accomplished.

Most fortunately for the College, for our young men and women and for all concerned, Principal Robertson succeeds Dr. Anderson with such credentials as give promise of a successful career and abounding usefulness. His college course was a brilliant one; he has been highly successful as a teacher and professor; he is endowed with qualities of mind and heart which are the best accessories to learning and the teaching faculty; he has the confidence of the students and is popular with them, and being in the prime of manhood we may safely predict for him a long as well as a useful career in the position to which he has been promoted.

Prof. McMillan comes to his new duties also well accredited, as a "young man of more than ordinary promise, with judgment matured beyond his years, with lofty ideals and a strong ambition to realise them. We doubt not that he will give a good account of himself.

Mr. Fowler, Conservative M. P. for King's, N. B., has begun a civil action against Councillor Thomas Gilliland, of Rethesay, for his failure to attend to his work as revisor of the electoral list of that parish. This is the case in which the lists were stuffed with hundreds of bogus names, which lists were since quashed by the Supreme Court. The county is now without an electoral list, and at the same time there is a vacancy in the county representation in the Legislature which cannot be filled. The Legislature is in session, too, so that the result is serious. Revisors are placed by law under heavy penalties if they do not transmit to the County Secretary a duly prepared legal list within a specified time. Every day's delay constitutes a new offense and the penalty is \$50 per day. Half the fine recovered goes to the person suing and the balance to the County Treasury. As the legal list should have been filed 10th November, the legal penalties are now some \$8,000.

It is reported that Hon. George E. Foster has decided to remain in private life for a year or two. It appears that notwithstanding his undoubted ability and prominence in the Conservative party no seat has been offered him which he cares to accept. It might also be something of a hardship for an old and leading parliamentarian like Mr. Foster to accept the position of a follower of Mr. Borden, who has been so short a time in political life.

The census of the United Kingdom will be taken on the 31st March instant by some 50,000 enumerators. The result is expected to be known early in the summer before Parliament adjourns. The census of Canada will be taken a few days later. This is also census year in Australia, and as the census in the United States was taken last year, we shall very shortly have a reliable enumeration of almost the entire English-speaking world.
