DEBTOR PAYS 20 SHILLINGS IN POUND

(By Dominion News Service)

London, Sept. 5.—A pleasant surprise awaited the creditors of William Cobham, basket manufacturer, of Mawdesley, Ormskirk, Liverpool Bankruptcy Court yesterday. The Official Receiver said he had realized enough to pay all of them other than Mrs. Cobham, 20s. in the pound and there would be a large sum left for his wife. It was a remarkable case of a debtor having considerably undervalued his property. His liabilities were £379, and assets reported are £263. It is understood that when Mr. Cobham's stock-in-trade and other effects were sold by auction, they realised more than three times the amount expected, there being keen competition among his trade competitors.

Can Make Coal of Valueless Lignite

(Canadian Press)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—Completion of apparatus which makes it possible to manufacture anthracite coal from comparatively worthless lignite was announced today by the Bureau of Mines. Efforts would be made at once, by officials of the Interior Department, it was said, to interest some commercial concern in the invention in order that its benefits may be made available to the public. The importance of the discovery may be realized, the bureau said, when it is known that the United States possesses 1,651,290,000,000 tons of easily mined lignite, of which 964,000,000,000 tons are located in North and South Dakota and Montana. This country annually imports large tonnages of anthracite and soft coal. The bureau's experiments were carried out in cooperation with officials of the Canadian Government. An oven was perfected which was said to turn the lignite into a fuel having practically the same heat efficiency as the best Pennsylvania hard coal. The Canadian authorities, after seeing the oven in operation, decided to construct a similar unit and to give it a thorough test. The Canadian tests also proved successful and Canadian engineers reported to the Department of Mines at Ottawa that the oven is "a practical, commercial oven, now past the experimental stage."

CARRIED REINDEER TO ANTICOSTI ISLAND

Interesting Labrador Trip of the C. G. S. Aranmore Now in Port.

The recent trip of the C. G. S. Aranmore, now in port, included the landing of reindeer at Anticosti Island and was one of peculiar interest. The reindeer, which are being bred for the purpose of using in harness in Labrador, where dog teams are now extensively used during the winter months, were first placed on the island at Lobster Bay. This spring it was found that they were falling victims to a lone wolf of gigantic size, who is still believed to be prowling uncaught in the vicinity. It is said that thirty reindeer were killed by this marauder whose foot-prints, according to one trapper who attempted to "bag" him, measured the width of his palm.

The presence of wolves in Labrador is not uncommon and they play havoc among the wild deer wherever these are to be found. These animals are smaller than the imported reindeer. For greater security the reindeer were taken during the spring to Camp Island in Lobster Bay but it was later decided to move them to Anticosti Island, where they are now in charge of a private company who will experiment in breeding them for ten years, giving back to the Government five animals for every one now placed on the island. Their value as harness animals has been proved in Norway and it was Dr. Grenfell who brought the original animals to Labrador from that country.

The Aranmore left this port over five weeks ago and proceeded to Camp Island and found there 150 reindeer. In order to get them aboard the crew had to go ashore and round them up. This proved no easy sport. The animals were quite wild and showed bewildering speed. Some of the bucks were six feet high from tip of horns to the ground, and the spread of their antlers measured in some cases over four feet. Their horns at this season were the "velvet" and this made their capture harder. The crew built a strong wire covered with netting and the reindeer were driven into these inclosures for capture. Then their legs were tied together and they were taken to the boats, two of which were lashed together and planked over for conveyance of the animals to the steamer in the Bay. The driving of them into the cor-

als was the most strenuous part of the work and proved quite exciting. About twenty five animals were driven into a corral at a time. All the reindeer on Camp Island were rounded up with the exception of one fawn, which eluded pursuit and had to be shot. It would have been needless cruelty to have left the young animal alone on the island. On board the government steamer the reindeer were kept in pens built on the deck on both sides and forward, about twenty animals to each pen. These, like the corals, were covered and flanked with burlap. The bucks were particularly hard to manage and were continually fighting. Chiefly on this account there were about twenty "casualties" among the animals on the trip to Anticosti Island, which occupied three days. During this time they were fed on moss, one hundred bags of which had been taken aboard for this purpose.

The steamer touched first at Flat Island and St. Mary's Island and then proceeded to Ellis Bay Anticosti, where the reindeer were shipped on flat cars, a walk being built for them from the boat to the cars. They were driven about four miles inland, and turned loose with two herders in charge. The three days voyage accustomed the reindeer so much to human company that they became quite tame. First Officer I. D. Power of Yarmouth had chiefly to do with them and they developed quite an affection for him. The heads and antlers of some of the animals who died on the trip are being kept as souvenirs by the crew. They are said to be wonderful animals when trained to harness and can travel easily sixty miles a day. They live chiefly on moss and in winter will burrow under the snow for this fodder. From Anticosti the Aranmore proceeded to the light stations at Bird Rock, Cape Ray, St. Paul's Island and Capt. St. Lawrence. A wireless pole was taken from Cape Ray to St. Paul's Island where a wireless station is being built. Owing to the illness of Capt. Rhude on the voyage, Capt. O'Hearn took charge of the Aranmore during the trip. Capt. Rhude is now recovered and left yesterday on a short visit to Montserrat. Capt. O'Hearn returned this week to Quebec.

Is Here to Stamp Out Plague of Grasshoppers

Mr. J. A. Anderson, of the Entomological Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Kentville, N. S., arrived in the city Tuesday night on inspection connected with the recent grasshopper plague which has visited parts of the province. He was taken yesterday morning by Superintendent J. A. Clark of the Experimental Station through Montague, Valleyfield, Heatherdale, Kinross, Caledonia and through to Lewis and Iona and visited many places where Dr. Brittain had seen swarms of grasshoppers. The inspection showed that these insects have in most places disappeared. A great many dead ones were found in some places and it is evident that the blackbirds have destroyed many of them and that others have migrated. At Pownal live grasshoppers were discovered. They appeared to be recent arrivals as they had not yet destroyed crops to any extent. Mr. Anderson is remaining here

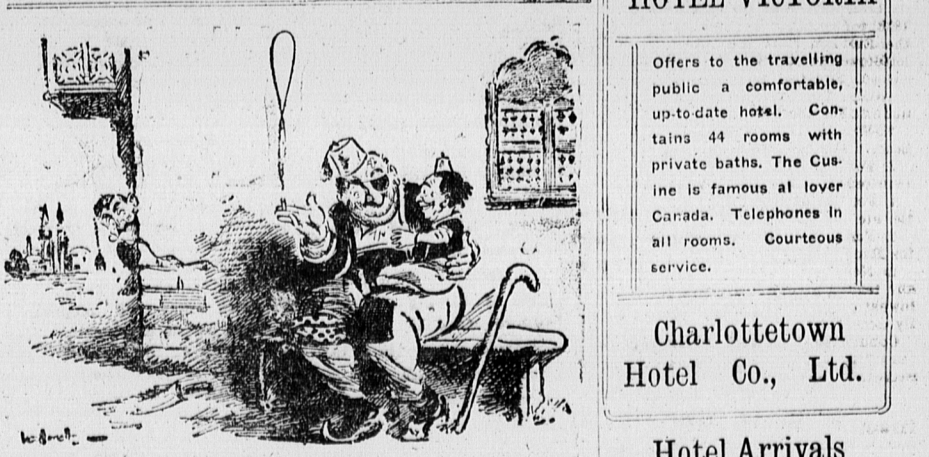

LONDON, Sept. 5.—For the first time since the Reformation a faith healing sermon has been preached in Westminster Abbey, and this has led to considerable criticism. The Rev. R. C. Griffith, vicar of St. Benedict's, Norwich, was the preacher, and he described scenes of faith healing which he had recently witnessed in East Anglia. He said: "Spiritual healing is a live thing. There is no nonsense about it. I have seen blind men regain their sight. I have known a man to shoot up an arm which had been withered for sixteen years and I have seen cancer cured within twenty minutes. In East Anglia, where I have just been working, thousands have walked from 9 o'clock in the morning until 11 o'clock at night in the streets, kneeling outside the little shrines where hands are laid on the sick. There I watched people who were stone deaf being healed in a few minutes, and returning they gave thanks publicly. Many persons asked advice of the Rev. Mr. Griffith after his sermon. Describing his own work, he said in an interview: "I have a small bowl specially blessed by the Bishop of the Diocese and I rub this oil over the patient's temples and forehead. Some time ago a worshipper came to me whose head was swathed in bandages. He had an abscess which protruded from his eye, but the moment he reached home and took off the bandage he found that the abscess had come down and no trace of it was left."
