A By-Law to regulate and compel the removal of snow and ice from off the Sidewalks—Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

Every tenant or occupant of any building or lot of land,—and in the case there is no occupant, or tenant then the owner or the agent of the owner, or any person having the care of any such building or lot of land bordering on any street, lane, square, or public wharf within the City of Charlottetown and Common thereof, where there is any foot-way or sidewalk, shall, after the ceasing to fall of any snow,—if in the day-time, four hours after, and if in the night, before ten o'clock of the forenoon succeeding, cause such snow to be removed from such foot-way or sidewalk, so far as such building or lot of land extends along such street, lane, square, or public wharf, and levelled off toward the centre of the street, so as not to close up the gutter or water-way; the gutter or water-way also to be opened and kept free from all obstructions, under a penalty of two dollars for every neglect, and the further sum of one dollar each day for every day such snow shall not be removed.
The provisions of this section shall also apply to the falling of snow from any building.
2. Whenever the foot-way or sidewalk or any part thereof adjoining any building or lot of land along any street, lane, or square, shall be encumbered with ice, it shall be the duty of the tenant or occupant,—and in case there be no tenant or occupant,—then the owner or person having the care of such building or lot of land, to cause such foot-way or sidewalk to be made safe by removing the ice, or by covering the same with ashes, sand, or other suitable substance. And in case such owner, tenant, occupant, or care-taker shall neglect so to do, for the space of two hours during the day-time, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of two dollars for every neglect, and a like sum of two dollars for every day such neglect shall be continued.
3. Every person who shall remove snow or ice from off their premises and place the same on any of the Streets, Squares, Public Wharfs, in the City of Charlottetown and Common, shall cause the same to be broken up in small pieces and levelled down and evenly spread on such Street, Square, Lane or Wharf to the satisfaction of the City Surveyor or any Police Officer of the City, and any person depositing or causing to be deposited any snow or ice on the ice formed on the Harbor of Charlottetown, shall not deposit the same within a distance of twelve hundred feet from any shore line of said Harbor and also in no case within a distance of two hundred feet from any bushed road or travelled track on the ice of the said Harbor. Any person contravening the provision of this section shall be liable to a penalty of two dollars for each offence.
4. It shall be the duty of any Police Officer or any permanent employee of the Street Department of the City to report to the City Surveyor any infraction of this By-Law that may come under their notice or be known to them as soon as possible after such knowledge is possessed by them. The City Surveyor shall take such action as he may deem advisable to carry out the intention of this By-Law.
5. Any person or persons guilty of an infraction of any of the provisions of this By-Law shall for each and every offence upon summary conviction thereof before the Magistrate of the City of Charlottetown forfeit and pay such penalty together with costs forthwith as is provided in this By-Law and in default of payment thereof it shall be lawful for the said Magistrate to commit the offender or offenders to the common jail of Queen's County for any period not exceeding ten days unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid.
