### Mexican Dept. to Introduce New Religious Measure

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 4.—A measure embodying new religious regulations limiting the number of priests in each state is being prepared for submission to Congress by the Department of the Interior. If enacted and approved by President Calles, these regulations will supplant those promulgated by the chief executive recently, which caused the religious controversy.

While nothing is known as to the details of the bill which the Department of the Interior is drawing up it is reported that it may permit one foreign clergyman to officiate in each church of a foreign congregation, and would apply to all denominations.

Meanwhile the Episcopate is busily engaged in completing the petition which it intends to place before the congress for modification of the religious laws, and in seeking some one to introduce and support the petition. Congress is still without a senate, the contests in the July 4th elections not yet having been settled.

### Heavy War Claims

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 4.—A group of naval officials which includes Capt. Frank K. Hill, retired, and Commander Harry E. Collins, will leave for England, September 8th, upon negotiations with the British government looking to settlement of approximately \$1,500,000 in claims growing out of United States naval operations in British waters during the war.

### Premier Meighen Has Strenuous Day

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Sept. 5.—Saturday was a strenuous and varied day for Premier Meighen. A delayed eastern train brought him to Montreal too late for the Ottawa train. He was billed to speak at Renfrew, Pembroke, Ottawa, and Hull, Que., before bedtime. An aeroplane was the only vehicle swift enough to carry him the whole route and an aeroplane was not available.

A special train carried him to Pembroke in the late afternoon. The Renfrew meeting had to be cancelled. At Pembroke a crowd still waited in the Armouries there. The Prime Minister discussed the tariff chiefly and assured his hearers that Conservative policy as regards protection for the woolen industry was the same as on any other industry. It would be a policy of a protective tariff high enough to permit the industry to compete with countries for home market. "When we've put it there," he added "we are going to leave there and give business a chance to grow."

### Live Stock Report

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 7.—Dumblin live stock report. There were 178 cattle, 745 lambs, 1125 hogs, and 291 calves for sale on the two markets today in addition to 125 cattle left over from yesterday. Trading was fairly active on small stock but rather slow on cattle. Most of the cattle sales today were common Holstein bulls at from 2.85 to 3.25 with heavier ones 3.75 and some cows at around 2.00 and 2.50. Veal calves were in good demand at from 7.00 to 11.00 and grassers 4.50 to 5.00. The heat lamps were sold for 12.75 for the ewes and wethers and 11.75 for the hogs from the same lots. Hog prices were firm at 12.75 to 13.00 for good quality hogs. Sows sold for 10.00 and 10.50 according to weight and quality.

### Dictator Has Consented To Plebiscite

MADRID, Sept. 4.—General Primo de Rivera, the premier, had consented to the holding of a plebiscite, September 11, 12 and 13, in order that the people of the country may express their regime.

A new party, the patriotic union, which requested the plebiscite, has also asked that the National Assembly be summoned to cooperate in governing the country and to this the premier also has acceded.
