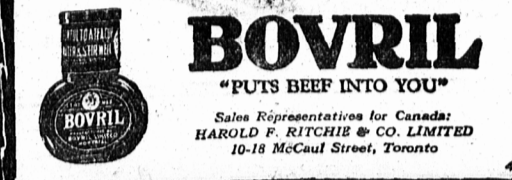

In Memoriam

MR. LAWRENCE DRISCOLL. Friends throughout this province grieved with regret of the tragic death of Lawrence Driscoll on a farm a short distance outside of Regina.

The young man, who was employed on the farm of Mr. George Halliday, was killed by a horse on March 26th. He was left in charge while Mr. Halliday was on a visit to the city and on his return Mr. Halliday found the deceased lying unconscious between two horses.

Medical aid was at once summoned and the injured man rushed to the hospital in Regina, but as a remembrance had set in he died on the train before reaching the hospital.

A post mortem examination was held the following morning by the coroner, Dr. Mitchell, who decided inquest was unnecessary.

A military funeral was held on the following Wednesday at Holy Rosary Cathedral, Regina, and the large attendance was a silent testimonial of the esteem in which the late Mr. Driscoll was held in his community. The pall bearers were officers of the Royal Mounted Police.

The deceased was a native of this island and is a son of Mrs. John Driscoll, now residing in this city. He served overseas during the Great War and on his return from France, remained at home for a short time, and then left for Saskatchewan where he had been working up to the time of his death.

Judgments Delivered at the Supreme Court Yesterday

CANADA, PROVINCE OF (PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND) IN THE SUPREME COURT Ernest E. Packman, Plaintiff vs. Charles Henry Benoit an absent or absconding debtor Defendant

Judgment Delivered by Mr. Justice Arsenault

This is an absent debtor suit in which under the provisions of Section 11 of The Absent Debtor Act 1873 Mrs. Edith Benoit, wife of the defendant, was allowed to discontinue the proceedings on the grounds set out in the order of the 18th January last, 1925. This suit came on for trial at the last Hilary Term of this Honourable Court when the case was heard and judgment reserved.

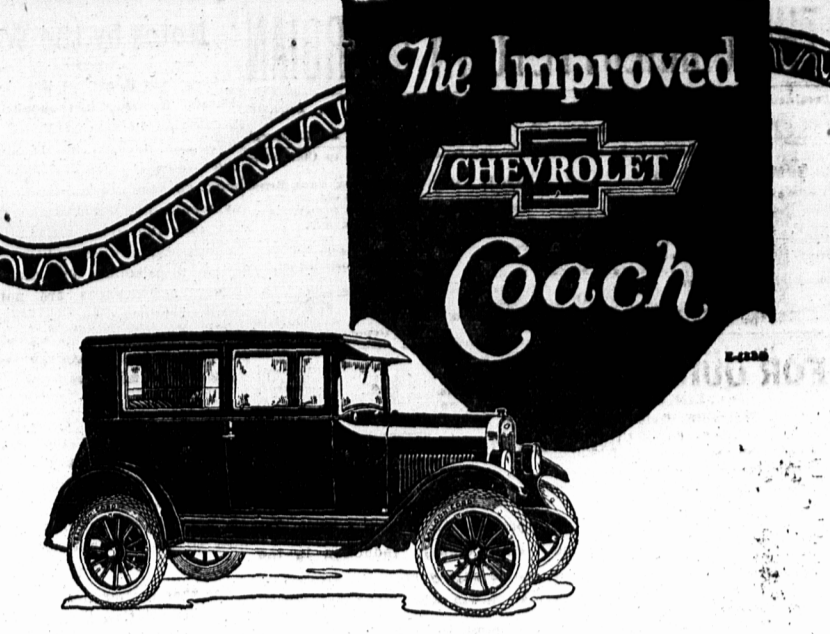
The affidavit which the attachment was issued is on a promissory note for the sum of twelve hundred and forty-four 91-100 dollars, dated the 21st day of January, 1925 payable to the plaintiff at the Royal Bank of Canada, Charlottetown, three months after date with interest at the rate of seven per cent per annum as well before as after maturity.

The contention of Mrs. Edith Benoit is that payment of this note cannot be enforced as it was given for an illegal purpose in contravention of the laws in force in this Province relating to the possession, sale and importation of spirituous liquor in the Province.

The plaintiff claims that this note represents money paid and advanced by him for and to be used by the defendant in connection with the hauling and construction of a building known as the Hochford Apartments, as well as a small account for rawing and rigging the cost of drawing and registering a mortgage from the defendant to the plaintiff, and that the note was given by the defendant in settlement of such account. Mrs. Benoit however contends that this brings forward evidence that the note is a balance of a larger note, namely a note for \$4900 given by the defendant to the plaintiff on or about the 7th day of March 1921 and which note was accounted at the Royal Bank of Canada, Charlottetown, and a writ proceeded against for the most part to the plaintiff in Charlottetown, and which the plaintiff well knew, and that such liquors were intended to be sold contrary to the law of the Province, and that such being the case the said note was given for an illegal purpose and cannot be collected in whole or in part by the plaintiff and that even if part of the note was for money legally advanced among money advanced for an illegal purpose the whole of the moneys represented by the note of \$4900 become tainted with illegality and cannot be collected.

I cannot accept this view, I find as a matter of fact that the whole of the original advance, \$4900, represented money due the plaintiff in connection with the Hochford Apartments and for money paid to the witness Fraser which according to the Customs of Canada would be legal to collect money if the Customs of Canada to receive the money surely it was legal for the defendant to pay it. Moreover the Customs witness Fraser swears that those liquors were legally imported into the Province.

I am not concerned as to what disposition was made by the defendant of this liquor after the duty was paid. I am only concerned with the money borrowed and if this money was borrowed for a legitimate purpose then the lender cannot permit those who are merely

would mean paralysis for the Maritime.

Under Direction of Forke. In 1925 while "anchoring" for Progressives and wishing to keep the support of the protectionist L. Herold, St. John's, Mr. King had a meeting with Forke and promised that no changes in tariff would be made without exhaustive and scientific consideration. By Mr. Forke, who directed the government but bore none of the responsibilities, except to his own constituents of Brandon, and directed that a blow be struck at the automobile industry and the Prime Minister could only "bow the knee to Baal and repudiate the solemn pledges given to the country." Canada is producing less and importing more, he said. Of the billion or so dollars spent on imports every year by Canadians, half a billion went for articles from the western farms, and if simply by bringing people to work on the western farms," said Mr. Cahan. If taxation was to be reduced and the national debt paid off a million more workers would have to be employed in Canada. The western farms could not take care of a million more workers for ten years to come. If every commodity for home consumption was made whenever possible in Canada, "we can place this country in a position of prosperity unequalled in the world today," asserted Mr. Cahan.

Robert Forke, Progressive leader, asked if Mr. Cahan believed a higher tariff would not help the farmer, why did the agriculturalist of the United States find himself in the position he was in now?

Bridges Sues In-Laws \$100,000 For Alienation

BOSTON, May 4.—Charging alienation of his wife's affections, Harold S. Bridges of Somerville has brought suit for \$100,000 in Middlesex County Court against Judson H. Clow, his wife's brother-in-law, and Oliver P. Clow, wealthy North Cambridge builder.

Bridges claims that without previous warning he was "fired" by his wife's brother-in-law and upon going to his home found that his wife and furniture were gone. Bridges could find no property that he could attach with ease and for that reason he was compelled to bring suit to restrain the Clows from disposing of the stock which was in the form of a trust, which they hold in Clow Brothers, the building concern.

Mrs. Bridges is staying at the home of her sister, Mrs. Judson H. Clow, 32 Lexington Avenue, Cambridge. She declared that she left her husband for several reasons. One being a claim that he drinks, she said that she bought the clothes that she was wearing in 1924 and that when their baby was born three months ago, her sister had to send her money to buy the necessary clothing.

Judson H. Clow, one of the defendants, declared that he did not know Mrs. Bridges, that she is his wife and that she is staying at his home because he would not see her left out on the street. He also said that he had contemplated discharging Bridges for some time. Bridges is now staying with a sister at 363 Boylston Street, Brookline.
