TIME CHANGES NOV. 3RD

Winter Schedules Go Into Effect On Prince Edward Island—Steamer To Make One Round Trip Daily.

Canadian National Railways announce that commencing Monday, November 3rd, the present double daily service between Prince Edward Island and the mainland will be discontinued, and that the winter service will go into effect.

S. S. Prince Edward Island will make one round trip daily (except Sunday), leaving Boston about 9:00 a.m., after the arrival of train leaving Charlottetown at 6:45 a.m. and train leaving Summerside at 7:00 a.m. Mainland train will leave Tormentine at 10:20 a.m. arriving in Sackville at 11:45 a.m. leaving Sackville at 12:15 p.m. and arriving in Moncton at 1:45 p.m.

Connection for Quebec, Montreal and points West will be made with the Ocean Limited at either Sackville or Moncton. Connection will be made at Moncton with No. 13 train for St. John, carrying the through sleeper for Boston.

Connection will be made at Sackville with eastbound Maritime Express for Amherst, Truro and Halifax.

The steamer will make the afternoon trip from Tormentine to Boston, leaving about 2:40 p.m. after arrival of train leaving Sackville at 1:10 p.m. Train from steamer reaches Charlottetown at 6:30 p.m. Summerside 6:15 p.m. and Tignish 9:45 p.m.
