...WHARF NEWS—Seven hundred cases of mackerel, and 50 barrels of mackerel were landed by the Lady Sybil at the railway wharf Saturday. They were shipped by various firms in the Magdalene Islands and were consigned to the Portland Packing Co., and others in Charlottetown. A shark, eight feet long and weighing in the vicinity of 400 pounds, was the object of great curiosity at Matthew and McLean's wharf last week. On Thursday afternoon, as Mr. George Hurst was examining a monster herring trap, owned by Matthew & McLean, he was surprised to find this huge fish in the trap, and with great difficulty brought it ashore, where it soon was the centre of much attraction. In the afternoon it was hauled away and it is the opinion of a very progressive farmer that a shark mixed with clay and lime forms a rare and valuable manure. Matthew & McLean's wharf is the scene of great activity of late. The great quantity of mackerel that is landed here daily furnishes constant employment for a large number of men.

SOURIS SHIPPING NEWS

...The Heary Dicks, in charge of Captain Henry Butts, left for St. Pierre Monday morning, with a full cargo of live stock and farm produce, shipped by Sterna Bros. Souris. For the past ten days the "Dicks" has been anchored at Matthew & McLean's wharf, where she completed her cargo on Saturday last. Taking advantage of a light breeze, she sailed from port about 8 a. m. and was in the harbor when she was becalmed making little or no headway during the whole day. The genial and courteous salesman, Mr. George Pierce, has charge of the shipment and he can be depended on to dispose of it to the best advantage.

The Brig "Miriam G.", in command of Captain Cruickshanks, arrived from Wallace, N. S., Thursday afternoon, after an unusually rough passage. She had a cargo of 300 tons of "rip-rap" stone, which she intended to be discharged on Friday. This she was unable to do in the morning owing to rough weather. In the afternoon, however, she succeeded in casting anchor at the end of the break-water and, as the storm had abated considerably, began discharging. She completed her task Monday evening and moved out into the harbor. She will sail for Wallace at the first favorable opportunity, where she will again load up a cargo of "rip-rap" stone.

The schooner "Adana", in charge of Captain Lanigan, has finished discharging her cargo of 160 tons of "rip-rap" stone. On Thursday night she was anchored out in the harbor and on Friday pulled in near the railway wharf, where she was ballasted. On Monday she set sail for Wallace, where she will load up a second cargo of stone for the break-water.

The schooner "Ceil F.", which was engaged all summer carrying "rip-rap" stone for the break-water, discharged her last cargo on Wednesday last and is now moored at the railway wharf, where she is being loaded with produce by Thomas Kitchham, Souris West. As soon as her cargo is completed she will sail for Sydney, where she will discharge.

The schooner, Sir Wilfrid, bound from Pictou to the Magdalene Islands, with a cargo of coal, was forced by stress of weather to put into port Thursday evening. She sailed

again on Friday afternoon.

The schooner, Telephone, Captain Lane, is now in Souris harbor. She has on board a cargo of coal and was bound from Sydney to Summerside. Under stress of weather she was forced to pull into port and here she remained for the past ten days. In all probability, she will resume her voyage in the course of a few days.

The schooner M. R. A., with Captain A. Arsenault, in charge, also put into port on Thursday, and sailed on Friday. She had a cargo of merchandise for the Magdalene Islands.

The Lime light, Captain Bushey, arrived in port last week and is being loaded with live-stock and produce by J. J. Hughes & Co. On Thursday she intends sailing for St. Pierre, weather permitting.

The Lady Sybil arrived from Pictou at 5 p. m., Thursday, and was forced to remain over night on account of the very unfavorable weather. The gale increasing greatly in fury during the night, forced her to put out her spare hawsers. She left for the Magdalene Islands at 6:30 a. m. Friday. She landed a cargo of flour for J. J. Hughes & Co., and also a large quantity of way-freight. Her outward cargo was small consisting chiefly of merchandise. Among her passengers were Mr. Bernard H. McDonald, who was returning to Souris after a few months spent on the main-land; Mr. J. H. Turnbull, who was returning to his home in the Magdalene after completing his contract with the Peru Medicine Co. and Mr. John Hector Millev, who was returning from St. John, N. B.
