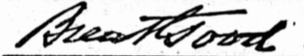

### STARCH MATERIALS.

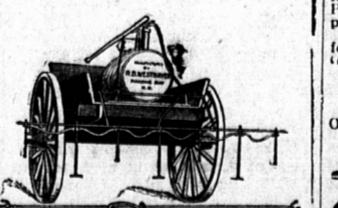
Mr. M. D. Jones, of the College of Agriculture University, of Maine, has just completed the second round of lectures on "The Materials which Plants use in the Manufacture of Starch." The work consisted of a demonstration, which is intended to show that the plants take up water from the soil and carbon dioxide from the air, and the presence of sunlight units, these two materials in such way as to form starch. He explained how in carbon dioxide and water the three elements, carbon, hydrogen, and oxygen were found and that in starch were also found these three elements. Mr. Jones urged that the fact be impressed upon the pupils that in the green plant, growing in the sunlight was the only place where starch was actually made and that all other foods which were found in plants usually, proteins, carbohydrates or oils, were built up from the starch, so that starch was the first produce made in the plant from which other materials were built. He then impressed the fact of how the animal kingdom was entirely dependent upon the plants for their food, and that should the sunlight be withheld from the face of the earth we would all soon perish with starvation.
