WORK BEGUN ON NEW HOTEL SITE—The demolition of the building, formerly the Knights of Columbus' Home, on the corner of Kent and Pownall Streets, was begun yesterday afternoon in order to make room for the new C. N. R. Hotel. Yesterday evening the steam shovel to be used in the excavation work arrived. It is intended to carry on the work day and night until the foundation work is finished. The plumbing and heating equipment of the building has been purchased by Currie & Murnaghan, who commenced the removal of the fixtures yesterday morning.

NARROW ESCAPE—Last evening about five o'clock a youngster about eight years old was struck by a car proceeding down Queen Street, directly opposite Prowse's store. Apart from a bad fright and a bad shaking up the boy appeared in no way hurt. At Rotary

It was Boys' Work day at the Rotary Club yesterday and the speaker was Mr. E. D. Otter, of the National Council Y. M. C. A., Toronto. Mr. Otter made an earnest and forceful appeal to the Rotarians to interest themselves in individual boys, learn their needs and endeavor to do what they can to give these boys guidance and encouragement, at the same time taking into account what the churches, Y. M. C. A.'s and similar organizations are doing. He referred to the program of boys' work which is being carried on by other organizations in the community and stressed the need of co-operative and systematic work. Before Mr. Otter spoke, Rotarian Ray Pendleton, chairman of the boys' work committee, asked the Rotarians to consider and report at a later meeting whether the money devoted in the past for a toboggan slide would be devoted for relief work. He gave as a specific instance a certain distressed family which sorely needed help. Rotarian Heath MacIntyre presided yesterday and the musical program included a vocal solo by Miss Huelsis and a harmonica solo by Miss Lilly MacEachern, both entertainers being heartily applauded. 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PROPOSAL FOR FLYING INSTRUCTION

An interesting proposal from Mr. R. J. McCully, Inter-provincial Airways Ltd. with a view of creating greater enthusiasm for aerial transportation in the local flying club and throughout the Island in general has been received by Mr. Joseph Bulger, city, recently. The following extract from Mr. McCully's letter speaks for itself: "If you can get twenty members who will do some active flying two days per week, we are prepared to send a plane and instructor to Charlottetown on the most suitable days each week to carry out instructions from the ice on the bay. This will make a very suitable aerodrome there being practically no danger whatsoever. From the financial standpoint we will charge \$25.00 per hour for instruction and \$15 per hour solo. Just how to arrange payments, I am not quite sure at the moment. This can, however, be worked out satisfactorily. Knowing your activity regarding the advancement and promotion of the flying club at Charlottetown, you will readily appreciate how this will create sufficient enthusiasm so that the public and your club will get together in the spring and form a permanent training school, which is what your people want and need."

Investigation At Summerside

An investigation was held by Supt. Wyatt in the Police Court at Summerside on Monday afternoon, at the investigation of the Mayor and Council, into the origin or cause of the fire which on the morning of October 22nd, gutted the premises of M. L. Frank MacKenzie, then a prohibition officer, on Central St. The evidence of Mr. MacKenzie and two of the firemen was taken and occupied the attention of the Court until 5.30 p. m. Mr. MacKenzie in giving evidence, stated that he had kept store on these premises for several years before the fire, and during that time he had not been molested and nothing had happened in the way of any damage to his store or stock. Directly he was made a prohibition officer, he was subjected to much annoyance and in his opinion, the motive of the fire was on account of his appointment and activity. In his evidence, Mr. MacKenzie said that on the evening before the fire he left the store locked up and the shutters on the window, facing Patrick Wattson's premises fastened with an iron bar on the inside. The window facing on Roy Silliphant's property, was fastened in the same way. He did not visit the store again that night nor did any other person with his permission. He was awakened shortly before five o'clock by his wife who told him the store was on fire. When he arrived, the firemen were there. They had evidently gained admittance through the back of the premises. After the firemen had left, Mr. MacKenzie examined the premises to ascertain the origin of the fire, and he came to the conclusion that the fire had started in the corner of the back shop, over by his desk, about ten feet away from the stove. There was no fire in the stove when he left the night before. A party, who was present, picked up and handed to him a bottle which smelt strongly of kerosene oil and asked Mr. MacKenzie if he used kerosene oil at the shop, and he said no. He found the door leading to the back shop from
