Ayrshire Breeders Meet

Messrs. Fred McRae, Charlottetown Royalty and Bert R. Brown, York, returned on Saturday night from Montreal where they attended the annual meeting of the Canadian Ayrshire Breeders' Association.

On Tuesday the 17th ult., the directors held their meeting. This board consists of 14 members. Six are chosen from the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec and one each from the Western and Maritime Provinces. The meetings are held alternately in Montreal and Toronto and seven members of the board retire each year. At the Toronto meeting they are elected for Ontario and the West and at Montreal for Quebec and the East. Mr. McRae has been on this board for a number of years.

On Wednesday the annual meeting took place with the president, Mr. L. J. Tarte of Montreal in the chair. Much important business was transacted among which was the raising of the membership from two to three dollars per annum. When the election of directors took place, Mr. McRae declined to be nominated and Mr. B. R. Brown was nominated and elected to represent the Maritime Provinces.

At a subsequent meeting of the Directors, Mr. A. S. Turner of Ryckman's Corner was chosen President and Mr. W. F. Stephen re-elected Secretary-Treasurer.

On Wednesday night a banquet was held in the Queen Hotel with about 150 present including some ladies. Among the prominent speakers were Prof. Barton of McDonald College and Mr. Watson, Secretary of the American Ayrshire Breeders' Association.

Thursday was visiting day and a number of the members proceeded to Huntington, some fifty miles from Montreal, one of the great Ayrshire centres. From there the party went to Howick, the home of the Nesses. Mr. R. R. Ness is probably the largest Ayrshire breeder on the Continent owning some 250 head valued at \$100,000.00. Here were seen many of the cows that are famous for their winnings not only at Toronto and other Canadian exhibitions, but also for their winnings at American shows. Thus ended a day of pleasure and profit, the members returning to their homes and the delegates from P. E. Island resolving to boost the breeding of the Ayrshire cow in their own Province.

Dardanelles Open To American Trade

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The Dardanelles were thrown open to American trade interests Saturday for the first time since the world war began, by action of the war trade board, following cable advices that an agreement had been reached by the Supreme Economic Council in Paris, which would make such a step possible without destroying the effectiveness of the blockade of the central powers. It is understood here that the trade and shipping interests of Great Britain and other foreign interests will receive the same privilege as from their governments and that rate schedules will be announced soon. The agreement carries with it a resumption of trade relations with Turkey and Bulgaria with which Great Britain and the Allied nations of Europe are still theoretically at least at war.
