Corbett Ellis Take Stand in Own Defence

another for a week wouldn't you have noticed it?" "I don't know." "Didn't you see them at meals?" "Yes."

"Didn't they speak to one another then?" "I don't remember." "For days and days." "I don't remember."

Counsel endeavored to elicit the information in another way but witness persistently said she didn't remember anything in this connection.

"I was the witness who told the mother of having heard the snoring noise in the room of the deceased as she came upstairs. She didn't know exactly how long it lasted. However, it lasted for the time she was coming up the stairs and going along the hall. Then both she and her mother listened. The thump was heard just after that."

"Did you feel the room shaking?" "I can't remember exactly." "What did the thump sound like?" "Something falling."

"Why did that make you uneasy?" "Because it sounded peculiar." "Your brother came home at five o'clock?" "Yes."

"And although you were feeling uneasy you had supper first?" "Yes. Witness said they had supper afterwards. She took food to her mother, Corbett lit a cigarette.

"But there was no talk of supper for Marie?" "No."

Regarding the social evening at Christmas time the witness said the deceased didn't take part because she couldn't dance. Marie would not accompany Ida to church or to entertainments.

Mr. William Ellis father of the prisoner was examined by Mr. Strong. The witness was at Misericorde when the tragedy occurred. He corroborated the story told by Evelyn about Marie's display of temper in the pump incident.

Mr. Ellis said that when the deceased arrived he received her as his daughter and treated her as such. He tried to make things nice and comfortable for her but did not go out of the way to do so.

She complained she said of her surroundings and also remarked that the people were uneducated. He did not take particular notice of the relation between Corbett and his wife.

Mr. Ellis said that the explanation for not going to church was that her father was a preacher but not a Christian. On that ground she felt all preachers were the same.

LAST TAKE ELLIS ... Cross-examined by the Crown Counsel the witness repeated the last statement. It was due to the treatment accorded her by her father.

"Did you know that the only disagreement she had had with her father was over marrying your son?" "No."

"Did she tell you that she entered into a bogus marriage?" "No."

"Did she tell you she was married at a vicarage and that the marriage turned out to be illegal?" "No."

"Did you know they were married the second time?" "No."

A marriage certificate was produced by Counsel. It was dated August 5th, 1919, and showed that the ceremony was performed at a registry office.

"Did she tell you her husband was in custody at the time; that he was under the escort of Captain James?" "No."

"Did she tell you that they had been living together for some time?" "I understand that she lived with my son about two months before they were married."

"Do you understand that she told your wife that their's had been a marriage that was illegal?" "No I don't understand that."

Tobacco Factory In Summerside Destroyed by Fire

A bad fire occurred in Summerside last night by which the tobacco factory recently started there by Messrs B. Mahar and B. Hooper of Charlottetown, was wiped out. The factory was located in the building opposite St. Paul's Hall, owned by Joseph Read & Co., and the building was left a ruin.

The alarm was rung in about 9.15 and the fire had gained great headway when the firemen arrived. Fortunately there was little wind or the result might have been far more disastrous. It was soon under control. The loss to Messrs Hooper and Mahar whose plant suffered total loss is a heavy one amounting to between three and four thousand dollars with very little insurance. The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed to have started in the drying room.
