NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—There has been some talk of late that outside interest in the market has begun to be felt in a minor way and the increase in Brokers Loans last week, although moderate, was accepted as proof of the entrance of the public into the market. Some take this as an indication that the general public is beginning to believe business improvement has already begun. Stocks opened moderately strong today and the rally was rather well sustained throughout the morning with minor reactions accompanied by smaller volume. Electric Power and Light was one of the more prominent leaders based on expectation of further developments in connection with its natural gas interests. Some covering occurred in Int. Tel. and Tel. following declaration of the regular quarterly dividend.

There appears to be real reason for the optimism in merchandising lines as demand has increased remarkably since the beginning of the month and rumors are cropping up of scarcity of supplies in some lines.

In the early afternoon the tone became quiet as it became evident that the progress on the upside for the time being would be difficult. Copper stocks turned reactionary on the August copper figures which were more bearish than generally anticipated as refined stocks were up over 20 million pounds. The market made no progress on the upside this week, not surprising as considerable news has come out which could not be construed as favorable and a certain amount of liquidation occurred during the last hour from interest which little could be accomplished on the long side for the moment. Stocks turned generally on the downside. Nothing more than a normal reaction is generally anticipated.
