**THE CAPITAL OF THE WEST**

Mr. Gourlie Passed Away Yesterday Afternoon.

SELDOM, if ever, has such profound and universal sorrow fallen over the community as in the case of the death of J. A. Gourlie of this town, which occurred about five o'clock yesterday evening. Hourly since he was stricken with paralysis on Sunday night last inquiries as to his condition were being made by anxious friends not only in the town but throughout the Province. Few men have enjoyed such popularity as did the late Mr. Gourlie. Rich and poor alike looked upon him as a kind hearted jovial citizen. As a business man he had few equals. For over thirty years he had carried on a drug business in Summerside and his honesty, integrity and business ability won for him a full share of the public patronage. Throughout these years he had always kept the leading drug store in this province. For many years he practised his profession of veterinary surgeon, but latterly devoted his attention exclusively to the drug trade. He was, too, known throughout the Maritime Provinces as an interested horseman and yearly figured among the officials in track events. Although always paying the closest attention to business Mr. Gourlie was ever an ardent worker in the affairs of town and province, and was an energetic member of the Board of Trade. He had held the office of Government meteorological agent since the opening of the station here and always kept the public informed as to the nature of the atmospheric conditions. Over his death there is general mourning and words of the deepest regret are heard on every side. Mr. Gourlie will be sadly missed in the community, but more so in the home where he was a devoted and affectionate parent. Deceased was in the 58th year of his age. A widow, two sons and three daughters survive him. The sons are A. W. P. now of Maple Creek, Assa, and Arthur in Winnipeg both of whom are at present on their way home; the daughters are Misses Fannie, Eva and Ruth at home besides two daughters by his first wife viz Mrs. A. W. McKinlay at present visiting her old home here and one daughter living in the Western States. Three sisters Mrs. Muncey, Parrboro, N. S.; Mrs. Robert Hogg, Charlottetown; Mrs. Outerbridge, Chicago also survive him.
