### NEW GOVT. FOR NORWAY

### FINAL CONQUEST OF ITALIAN SOMALILAND

CAIRO, March 7.—(AP)—The final conquest of Italian Somaliland was announced by the Middle East command today, along with the capture, destruction or grounding of 12 military merchantmen in naval operations which knocked out the colony's two chief bases for Indian Ocean raiders—Chisimio and Mogadiscio.

### No decision On N. B. field

OTTAWA, March 7.—(CP)—No decision has been reached by the Transport Department on a proposal that an emergency air field at Blissett, N.B., be converted into a regular airport for the Trans-Canada and Northeastern Air Lines operating between New Brunswick, Upper Canada and United States points, Department officials said today.

### Said Offering Terms Without Territory Loss

### Indications time not yet quite ripe for Nazis to march; Yugoslavia still on doubtful list.
